

BACK TO VALLEY


Charlton Athletic's dream of returning to their former home at the Valley could now become a reality after months of heartbreak and disappointment. Peter Burrowes talks to Mike Norris, (pictured right).

revised planning application for the redevelopment of the ground is being submitted to Greenwich Council this month. The Club, subject to receiving approval from the planning committee, is hoping to be back playing football at the Valley from the start of 1991/2 season in a 20,000 capacity stadium. This will incorporate commercial and leisure facilities.

PROGRESS

After the rejection of the Club's previous plans for the Valley, a number of meetings have been held between Council officers and Charlton Directors, and considerable progress has been made. A recent meeting also took place between Chairman Roger Alwen, Vice-Chairman Michael Norris, the Council Leaders and Planning Committee Chairman to discuss the revised proposals.

"If, as we hope planning approval is forthcoming, we should be on site by the end of the year."



Mr Norris told Charlton magazine that the outline plans, will be submitted to the council by the end of August to be followed by detailed proposals.

The revised proposals include the building of a new, four level, cantilever stand along the whole length of the pitch with 4,500 seats and 30 hospitality executive boxes. Incorporated in the new stand will be a 25-lane bowling alley covering 35,000sq. feet as well as 10,000 sq. feet of fitness centre provision. The Valley Club will be relocated in the new stand as well as conference / function facilities and Club administration offices.

There will also be parking facilities inside the ground for 250 *Continued on Page 3*.

ENGLAND MANAGER WATCHES CHARLTON YOUNGSTER PROGRESS

harlton Athletic new boy Thevinh Nguyen was presented with his international cap by recently appointed England manager Graham Taylor when he graduated from the GM Vauxhall FA National School on Tuesday 10 July. He will now begin his professional career with pre-season training.

Thevinh is the second pupil from the GM Vauxhall FA National School to join The Valiants, following in the footsteps of defender Darren Pitcher. During his two-year scholarship the 16-year old forward appeared in all 12 international fixtures at Under-15 and Under-16 level emerging as top scorer with four goals, two versus Sweden, one against Finland and the winner at Wembley Stadium in the Vauxhall Challenge victory over a Scandinavian Select X1.

The GM Vauxhall FA National School was established in 1984 to prepare England's most promising 14-year olds for a career in professional and international football. With the oldest graduates

Joe McLaughlin was with Charlton for a year making 37 league and cup appearances.

Paul Williams joined Charlton from Woodford Town in February1987 and scored 29 goals in 95 League and Cup games.

The East terrace will initially be used for standing in the lower section but will ultimately become a seating area in line


with the Taylor Report.

The Sports Pages that pointed the way back to The Valley

ye bye Simon, bye bye" rang out from all corners of this great democratic institution. So loud, in fact, that you could probably have heard it 100 yards away down at Woolwich Police Station, which is just as well really, because that's where Oelman, Simon James, Sidney (Lab) just happened to be.

'NICKED'

What was the (former) councillor doing in the nick, I hear you ask. Well it's a long story (that's an understatement), but for the purposes of space, we'll keep it brief and begin this particular chapter back on 31st January 1990. It was at Woolwich Town Hall (see how neatly this all fits together?) that Oelman, Simon, James, Sidney (Lab) really came into his own.

Not so much the immovable object, more the implacable objector, our Simon chaired the planning meeting with a firm hand. It was the 'any-more-noise-from-you-lot-and-we're-off-so-there' brand of chairmanship that so endeared our Simon to his public. 'Here's Dave Higham, employee of the Planning Department and circulator of dubious leaflets' he failed to announce when 'the enemy within' stepped up to the mike.

APPLICATION

If you were there - and let's be honest, who wasn't - you'll no doubt remember the tirade from Rick 'the arch orator' Everitt, which finished up by suggesting that refusal of Charlton's application would haunt them'for the rest of their political lives'. At the time, I remember thinking 'steady on old chap, that's a bit strong'. But it wasn't. It was true, and especially so in the case of our Simon.

He, of course, was the man who refused to negotiate with a third party, despite the fact that the third party he was referring to were, in fact, the people to whom he was supposedly responsible. He was the man who decided that our campaign was unimportant. He paid the price. Even on election night itself, he responded to a question from Dominic Crowe on the validity of 650 votes in

The Returning Officer paused, took a deep breath, and continued. "And I therefore declare that Barrie Groves and John Rastall be elected to serve for Eynsham ward."
Then - pandemonium. Talk about noise. You'd never heard anything like it. Anyone would have thought we'd won the F.A.Cup, such was the bedlam in Woolwich Town Hall at roughly 2.30am on the morning of Friday May 4th.

Charlton, by condescendingly referring to the result in that ward as 'a little protest vote'. Which makes it all the sweeter that he lost his votes, his seat, and eventually, his temper.

When the plot to contest this election was originally hatched a few months prior to that memorable evening, no-one had dared hope that the result would be so good. And to unseat Oelman, Simon, James, Sidney (Lab) was the ultimate prize. The

Labour party have since tried to convince us that we did not cause the defeat of the (ex) chair of Planning and Transport. In retaliation we point to the letter from Oelman, Patricia, that appeared in the Mercury blaming our intervention, and ask; why else did his personal vote drop by over 300? But that was not the only success we had that night, or should I say that morning. As dawn came up over Greenwich, it became clear that we had cost

them at least four seats and possibly one or two more. 992 votes in Sherard was a fantastic achievement, one candidate Kevin Fox felt could have been bettered. In Middle Park Ward we polled 24% of the vote, and in Kidbrooke we helped Jim Coughlan (one of the two councillors who said 'yes to The Valley') retain his seat at the expense of his running mate. And dare I say it, in Well Hall, despite a notorious candidate problem, a Labour gain was avoided by 35 votes.

THE BEST!

Which makes all the effort worthwhile. And believe me, it was an extraordinary effort. All the other parties (some more begrudgingly than others) agreed that our campaign had been by far the best. We'd produced the best posters, the best leaflets, and the best campaign bus! Now that's the way to travel. Hire an open topped bus and a megaphone, festoon it with banners and balloons and the world is your oyster! I'll never forget Quentin Marsh's face as we came down Eltham High Street with everyone on the top deck singing 'Bye bye Quentin'. It was a picture.

And perhaps that is one of the most satisfactory feelings of all. Yes it was worthwhile, as well as an achievement. But it was also great fun, and all the people involved must have been motivated by that, as much as the fact that they were all working towards a common cause. Which brings us to polling day itself. An astonishing 24 hours, beginning for most of us at 6 or 7am on the Thursday morning, and ending at roughly the same time on Friday.

INSPIRATION

With the entire borough leafleted the night before, there were plenty of jobs to be done. There were people in polling stations, and people driving round with megaphones, including one gentleman who was continually playing 'the red red robin'. There were leaflets being handed out at railway stations, and potential voters being knocked up and reminded to go to the polling station, all of which was

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coordinated at The Valley Club, a hive of activity and a source of communal inspiration.

Martin Thorpe's piece in the Guardian two days later summed it up. "By 7pm there were so many people turning up at The Valley", he wrote, "that there was nothing for them to do except soak up the tremendous feeling of camaraderie around the place.

That camaraderie was transplanted, first to the Director General in Wellington Street, before finally coming to a rest in Woolwich Town Hall itself, and it was to last us right through the night until the end.

CONCERN

Although the first result gave us cause for (misplaced) concern, it gradually became clear that the voters had turned out in their thousands to 'Vote Valley'. The attitude of our political foes was suddenly changing from detached amusement to genuine concern. I had tentatively ventured earlier in the day that we might, just might get ten thousand, and the statement had been greeted with scorn, but it seemed that we were on course.


They claimed our votes were meaningless without seats, but we had a much greater prize. True, winning a seat would have been headline news, but the removal of Oelman from the planning process could turn out to be one of the greatest single aids to Charlton's return home. Of course the (ex) councillor for Eynsham ward can still be involved in the planning procedure, but only if he writes a letter to his local councillor like everybody else.

Índeed, the new Planning and Transport committee, announced at the recent AGM, appears to be much more likely to reach a satisfactory conclusion than it's predecessor. Bob Callow and Jim Coughlan (who voted 'yes' originally) remain, and David Woodhead, the Liberal who voted against the plans has also been unlucky at the ballot box, which gives the P&T committee a much friendlier look.

But we've made our point -15,000 voters can't be wrong, and now it's up to our elected representatives to resolve the problem. Sure, they could ignore us, but they did that once before and look what happened. Alternatively, a solution could be reached for the benefit of all parties and that's what we've been asking for all along. And when that solution is found, everyone of us can feel proud. Proud that we were able to mount such a campaign. Proud that we refused to sink to the levels of provocation and intimidation witnessed at the count. And proud that each and every one of us has done our best for our

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
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Return to The Valley



oving back? The five-year campaign to bring Charlton home goes all the way to the ballot box. The Valley Party's attempt to return Charlton Athletic to their spiritual home is just the latest amazing chapter in the rich and often hilarious history of the club.

In such a situation, fans of other soccer clubs might take the law into their own hands. Only Charlton fans would have the imagination to try to influence events through the ballot box. Then again, only Charlton would be in this predicament in the first place.

Before Norman Tebbit and the Conservative media monitors scream "bias" at my support for the Valley Party, I should state that its policies are not concerned with such mundane matters as the economy, the community charge, the European Community, Harrods, nuclear power or even the environment.

This party campaigned in the Greenwich council elections on May 3 on a single issue of much greater import: getting Charlton Athletic Football Club (1984) Ltd back home to The Valley, Floyd Street Charlton, London SE7.

DEFINITELY RED

Yes, Norman, I am red; Charlton red (and white) and not afraid to speak up.

To Charlton fans, getting the local council, to approve the move back (we have been lodging, like Cinderella, with our step-sisters, Crystal Palace, in another part of south London for the past five years) equates with any of the topical issues of national sovereignty you care to name, be it the Middle East or the Baltic.

It is not Yitzak Shamir or Gorbachev who stands in our way, but Greenwich council. Our homeland, the 11-acre site just a free-kick from the southern exit of People who run broadcasting networks do not publicly declare their political leanings. Michael Grade, the head of Channel 4, renounces that dictum to reveal exclusively, in an article in The Guardian on 31st March 1990, that he wholeheartedly endorses a new party.

the Blackwall Tunnel, lies unoccupied.

The cost of updating and making safe the stadium (record attendance 75,031, v Aston Villa in 1938) is way beyond the club's resources. But a bright, new board has plans to reduce the surplus capacity and rebuild an all-seater stadium and pay for it by

commercially redeveloping some of the site.

These plans have been blocked by the present council, even though they had originally encouraged it. The Valley Party's aim is to win enough electoral support on May 3 to reverse this decision.

I have been a fan of the

Valiants, Robins or the 'Addicks (they have three nicknames) for 40 of my 47 years. My late father, Leslie, used to watch them regularly with the band leader Billy Cotton. They both loved soccer and were friendly with the club's founders, Albert and Stanley Gliksten.

We were an attractive midtable First Division side in those days, with characters like Sam Bartram and Sailor Brown. I used to go to watch them on a Saturday and soon became addicted.

It must be hereditary, for my son Jonathan is now just as fanatical. His academic performance seems to go up and down with Charlton's results. I hate to put even more pressure on our present manager, Lennie Lawrence, but if we stay in the First Division this season I expect Jonathan to sail through his GCSEs this summer with distinction.

EDUCATION


Although playing 38 away League matches a season is not really doing my son's education any good at all, if we can go back to The Valley I will not mind if we are relegated this season. That is how seriously Greenwich council have miscalculated.

The reason why I and thousands of Greenwich voters care so passionately about our birthright is the same reason that people revere other historic sites like the Chamber of the House of Commons, or the stage of the London Palladium. These are living arenas. You can go to and point to the actual spot where Churchill made his maiden speech, or where Judy Garland sat on the stage and sang Over the Rainbow. It is where the great ghosts live on in memory and should not be graveyards.

HISTORY

All the great and memorable moments of Charlton's history occurred at The Valley - save for our two FA Cup final appearances at Wembley in 1946 and 1947. Typically, these finals were remarkable. Both went to extratime. In the first, which we lost 4-1 to Derby, our half-back Bert Johnson distinguished himself by

scoring for both sides. We beat Burnley 1-0 the following year. The ball burst in both matches. Well it would, wouldn't it?

Other clubs post-war may have more glamour, more money, more supporters and more success. But no 40-year Arsenal or Liverpool fan has seen what I have seen - at The Valley.

Take the Saturday before Christmas in 1957, a mid-table Second Division match against Huddersfield. With 20 minutes left we were losing 5-1. We had only 10 men on the field, our England international centre-half and captain, Derek Ufton, being off injured (no subs allowed in those days). We scored five quick goals to take the lead 6-5. Huddersfield equalised. But with the last kick of the game, John "Buck" Ryan was through on his own and scored Charlton's winner.

"FEETFIRST"

It was at The Valley that I saw our Scottish international full-back John Hewie play in all 11 positions for Charlton - even goalkeeper. I saw Willie "Feet-first" Duff, our Scottish international goalkeeper punch the Everton centre-forward Dave Hickson in the face; before the referee could act Willie took off his green jersey, handed it to a


team-mate and headed for the dressing-room. He sent himself off.

It was at The Valley one night that I saw our striker Derek Hales sent off for punching another player in a cup match This was doubly unfortunate for Charlton because the other player was Mike Flanagan, Hales's Charlton team-mate.

MEMORIES

The memories and the moments are many. The Valley may be dormant just now, but it is still home for the ghosts of 'Charlton past: Hans Jeppson the Danish amateur whose goals saved us from relegation in the Fifties; Eddie Firmani, the Italian World Cup player; Syd O'Lynn (like Leary and Ufton, a Kent county cricketer); Mike Bailey, the England international; Billy Bonds, the West Ham stalwart and now their manager; and the great manager Jimmy Seed. Their deeds and their spirits pervade The Valley. That is where Charlton belongs, that is where the fans long to be.

I hope enough of them turn up to "Vote Valley" on May 3 so we fans can return to our shrine and keep the ghosts company. They have been watching the weeds grow for too long.

CHARLTON'S RETURN TO THE VALLEY GOES ALL THE WAY TO NO.10!

The following letter from the Department of the Environment, sent on behalf of the Prime Minister, was received by Mr. A. Hawkins of Orpington in reply to his letter expressing his concern about the handling of Charlton's application to return to The Valley by Greenwich Council.

Dear Mr Hawkins

Thank you for your recent letter to the Prime Minister about the difficulties being experienced by Charlton Athletic Football Club in their attempts to redevelop their ground at The Valley. The relevant planning application having been refused by Greenwich Council on 31 January. I have been asked to reply.

I can understand your concern over this matter, but should explain that all football clubs following the Government accepted recommendations of Lord Justice Taylor that they should move towards all-seater stadia must, where planning permission is

required, follow the normal statutory planning process. It is therefore the responsibility of the relevant local planning authorities to consider any such applications received on their merits, taking full account of all relevant planning considerations.

Should a local authority decide to refuse planning permission then clubs do of course have the formal right of appeal to the Secretary of State. I gather that Charlton Athletic have expressed their intention to exercise their right. In the circumstances, I am sure you will understand that I am unable to comment more specifically, lest I prejudice the Secretary of State's quasi-judicial role in the matter.

On a more general note, you will perhaps be interested to know that the Football Authorities have raised with the Secretary of State the difficulties being experienced by some football clubs in securing planning permission for either redevelopment of existing grounds or for new stadia on different sites. Clubs assist can themselves greatly approaching their local planning authorities at the earliest possible stage in the foundation of their own plans and in the preparation and review of local plans by the relevant local planning authorities.

I hope the foregoing has given you a clearer insight to the intricacies of the planning system in respect of these developments from the Department's standpoint.



ndy was born in Market Harborough on New Year's Day, 1961. He joined Second Division Leicester as an apprentice on leaving school in 1978 and became a professional a year later, on his eighteenth birthday. His first-team debut came just six days later in Leicester's 3-0 FA Cup Third Round win over First Division Norwich. The match was one of only three ties played that day as icy weather gripped the country and I seem to remember that Leicester's Keith Weller donned black tights to keep out the cold (well, that was his excuse). Andy's League debut came a fortnight later in a 1-1 draw with Blackburn Rovers. Leicester's manager at this time was Jock Wallace, and Andy retains a high regard for the tough Scot. "A great man to work for. A disciplinarian, certainly, but totally straight with the players. You always knew exactly where you stood with him.

FORMULA

The Wallace formula paid dividends, too, with Leicester winning the Second Division and Andy collecting a Championship medal. That season also saw his selection for the England Youth Team. He scored on his debut, a 3-1 win over Denmark in Esbjerg in October 1979, and three of his team-mates would be future colleagues at Charlton: Colin Pates, Tommy Caton and Steve Mackenzie. At the end of that season he played in all five matches in the European Youth Tournament Finals in East Germany, England drawing with Portugal and beating Yugoslavia, Holland, Northern Ireland and Poland in the final to win the competition.

RELEGATION

Andy's First Division career began with a bang, as his thirty-yarder helped Leicester on their way to a 2-0 win over League Champions Liverpool, but it was all downhill after that, Leicester being relegated after just one season in the top flight. They fail in their efforts to win a return at the first time of asking but in October 1981, Andy again plays for the England Youth Team, this time in the FIFA World Youth Championships in Australia. He plays in all six matches as England finish fourth, and in April 1982, he adds an U-21 cap to his thirteen Youth caps when he appears in England's 2-2 draw with Poland at Upton Park.

PERFORMANCE



'Character' one of those words much-loved of football managers and which, like 'class', is difficult to define. It is easier to say who has or has not got 'it' than to say what 'it' actually is. In footballing terms, character is not just a matter of resolve or determination, but it is about allying these to discipline, perhaps to the extent of subjugating your natural game to the greater good of the team. One player in whom this quality is not lacking, I would venture to suggest, is Andy Peake, a veteran of our last four First Division campaigns.

Jock Wallace left Filbert Street to take charge at Motherwell in July 1982 and Gordon Milne arrived as replacement. Promotion was won in Milne's first season but Andy was largely a spectator, figuring in just 2 (2s) League appearances all season. Too much the diplomat to be openly critical of Milne, it is nevertheless clear that Andy didn't share the same relationship that had existed with Wallace. Although he appeared more regularly in 1983/84 and 1984/85, seasons in which Leicester tenaciously clung to their First Division status, his future seemed uncertain. In August 1985 the opportunity to join Second Division Grimsby arose, and he didn't hesitate, signing for 'The Mariners' for a fee of around £105.000.

APPEARANCES

The move, in retrospect, was not an ideal one but it did bring regular first-team football. In fact, Andy's stay at Blundell Park would be of just over a year, because in September 1986 he joined Charlton for a fee of £75,000, arriving on the day that Colin Walsh joined us from Nottingham Forest. Andy is perhaps an archetypal Lennie Lawrence signing, a player of proven ability whose career has reached an impasse, and who is given the chance to prove himself anew. His Charlton debut came in our 2-0 defeat at Anfield on 13th September 1986 and since then he has clocked up over 130 firstteam appearances, performing an unglamorous but very necessary role in the midfield engine-room. His only major spell out followed a knee ligament injury in December 1987 which kept him out of the team until the end of that season. Notwithstanding that, only Bob Bolder, John Humphrey, Mark Reid and Robert Lee have appeared more frequently over the last four seasons.

DISAPPOINTING

Obviously our failure to beat the drop is a major blow. How did Andy view the campaign? "Clearly our lack of goals was the major factor but we also suffered from having such a small squad. We must have about the smallest squad in the top divisions. There just isn't the strength in depth to cope with injuries." So where does that leave us for next season? "It's difficult to say. It really depends on what happens in the Summer. If we can keep the present squad intact and

add two or three new players, then I feel we can make a genuine challenge for promotion. But having said that, the club is bigger than any of the players. If the financial situation dictates that players have to be sold, then we have to accept that and be professional enough to make the best of things." How does he view the prospect of another season at Selhurst Park? "Although I didn't play for Charlton at The Valley it still seems strange playing our home games over there. You can't identify with it as your own ground and the players are only too aware of how the supporters feel about the place as well".

AUSTRALIA

I wondered how the players viewed the three-week trip to Australia. Wasn't it an unwelcome diversion at the end of a tiring season? Andy disagrees, "Not at all. The preparations for next season begin now. The trip gave us a perfect opportunity to get away, sort a few things out, and rebuild our morale".

Andy is also the PFA representative at Charlton. If not exactly shop steward, he does act as an intermediary between the players and their union, and might also be required to intervene in







Still, the future of the Club is the most important thing now and I hope that the Club and the Council can settle the differences outstanding so the ground can be used again fir its proper purpose.





Nearly 19.5 million people attended Barclays League matches during the 1989/90 season. For the first time since 1981 figures topped the 19 million mark and for the fourth successive season gates increased.

cross all four divisions there was a 5.35 per cent rise in people through the turnstiles on the previous season.

In 89/90 almost 19.5 million watched the national game, a million more than the previous season. This encouraging statistic represents the highest attendance for seven seasons and further strengthens the popularity of football as a spectator sport.

One of the key reasons for the record figures is attributed to the hotly contested Second Division championship. This showed an impressive 18.13 per cent increase in Second Division gates representing a million more people through the turnstiles.

Manchester United topped the average gate table, again confirming their status as the game's top crowd puller, while in the Second Division, solid support for Leeds, Sheffield United and Newcastle helped swell the figures.

Newcomers Maidstone United celebrated their entry into the Barclay's League with an impressive 134 per cent increase in gates, compared to the previous season's non league figures.

Football pulls back its TV popularity

OCCER has pulled back its TV popularity among the young over American Football, a new book has revealed.

Last year soccer pulled ahead again by 2 per cent, but interest in both sports had dropped to 28 per cent and 26 per cent respectively.

However, in 1988, televised American Football overtook soccer in popularity with 15 to 24 year-olds, with 35 per cent saying they liked to watch it compared to a third who preferred soccer.

The research, published in "Games and Sets: the Changing Face of Sport on Television," by Steven Barnett, is published by the British Film Institute.

Mr Barnett, Assistant Director of the Broadcasting Research Unit and author of the book, said: "Declining soccer ratings and gate receipts lead to speculation that this quintessentially British sport is facing a consumer crises of disastrous proportions".

However, Football League News would also like to point out that without exception every sport in the country's top ten TV favourites has shown a dramatic decrease in popularity. Even snooker - the sport which shot to glory during the 1970s - hasn't increased its appeal to TV viewers for a decade.

Mr Barnett attributes the slump in interest to the fact that sport is becoming increasingly marginalised in television schedules, because it is seen to alienate the female audience. An indication, perhaps, that by increasing female interest and enjoyment of soccer the sport can, in turn, increase its TV ratings.

Just after England won the World Cup 24 years ago football was the most popular sport on television, with 52 per cent of

people saying they enjoyed it. Its top place has been usurped by snooker, and football now lags in fourth place, below athletics and tennis, with only 29 per cent claiming to enjoy watching it on television.

Trevor Phillips, Commercial Director of the Football League. commented on the research results "If a product in a highly competitive market on a supermarket shelf loses brand share, in general you'll see increased marketing activites to support that product and a commitment and hard sell attitude put behind it.

"Football is no different from any other product What we're witnessing is purely increased competition in what is now a highly competitive market for the TV Sports viewer. Only by aggressive grass-roots marketing to generate increased gates at matches will see a knock-on effect of increased armchair popularity".

On a slightly brighter note,

soccer appeared three times in the top ten rated sports programmes during 1989, with the First Division clinching Liverpool v Arsenal match attracting as many viewers as the FA Cup Final (10.3m). During 1988 the most watched TV soccer attracted an audience of only 8.9m (Match of the Day 21.2.88) and the FA Cup Final 7.8m.

Trevor Phillips, commenting on the BFI research, said: "Whilst this research reveals an encouraging upward trend in TV viewing of soccer, it also underlines the fact that there is much work to do simply to keep our game at the top end of the ratings where it belongs. It is also worth bearing in mind that 1989 saw the most exciting First Division climax possible and interest in our game was exceptionally high. Another indication we must never rest on our laurels; we cannot always rely on a season's

people who wouldn't otherwise listen to the station.'

For the first time the club can speak directly to its supporters, including those who are unable to attend Šelhurst Park regularly. It also gives the supporters the opportunity to speak directly to the club.

At which point there appears to be a problem. Supporters, naturally enough want to ask questions about topics like players leaving the club, team selection and the plans for The Valley. Steve Sutherland is in no real position to give answers. Indeed in many instances, it would be quite wrong of him to do so, since as commercial manager team affairs are obviously quite outside his remit.

On the other hand, if "unacceptable" views are screened out with too heavy a hand the programme will lose much of its appeal. Steve is as aware of this as anybody else, but believes the answer lies in getting the right people into the studio on

a regular basis.
"For instance, last week Joe McLaughlin was sold to Watford and there were a lot of noises about us selling our best players. Then Lennie Lawrence agreed to come down on Sunday. It was partly coincidence but it meant the fans could put their views straight to the man himself, which is the right way to do it", he said.

Other guests have included vice-chairman Mike Norris, director Richard Collins, current players Scott Minto and Andy Jones and former stars George Green and Charlie Revell. Youth team boss Collin Clarke enjoyed it so much he came back for a second visit, while chairman Roger Alwen has linked up by phone from his Sussex home.

But there has also been time to speak to people like company Secretary Chris Parkes, Valley Gold manager Andy Bryant, press officer Peter Burrowes, club photographer Tom Morris and Chief Steward Tony Fewell.People who may be less well known, but whose activities are a vital part of running a modern football club.

What they have found at the modest Thamesmead studios, (the station is based in a flat in the middle of a vast concrete estate,) is a deliberately informal 90 minute show that is no more and no less than what it's called, chat about Charlton.

It isn't journalism, but it isn't just about promoting the club either, although Steve concedes that he does take the opportunity to plug his own commercial department activities.

Of course those more used to Capital Gold's excellent football coverage might take some time to adjust from that station's rather breathless approach, but this is something else. The informality works, even if on occasion the microphones and tape decks don't!

Certainly, the supporters, deprived for years by the steady erosion of local press coverage and the predictable domination of the London-wide media by Arsenal and Spurs, seem to like what they're hearing.

FROM BADGER'S MOUNT TO ESSEX

Calls come in from all over the transmission area, and even from places which ought to be beyond it. Fan Mark Moncur, from Badger's Mount, near Sevenoaks was one of the furthest, although there have been other reports of listeners just this side of the Medway Towns and even in farflung parts of Essex.

In fact, the peculiarities of radio reception have become a source of vexation to some Kentish supporters. They include Richard Redden, author of the new club history, who complains that the RTM signal disappears a short distance from his West Wickham home!

Tapes of the programme

regularly change hands and it's rumoured some fans outside the area even get in their cars and drive around until they can pick it

Happily, a majority of supporters are getting the message loud and clear and they will no doubt be listening in even greater numbers as the new season gets under way. It's worth remembering that Steve and Clive launched the programme underthe not inconsiderable handicap of relegation and then the summer break.

That proved less of a problem than originally anticipated, perhaps because, as the Charlton fanzines have proved, there is an insatiable appetite for information, and particularly reminiscences, about the club.

The potential for Charlton Chat is almost unlimited. During the season there is considerable scope for reviewing the previous day's game. Radio is not necessarily the best medium for match reports, as fans of Kevin Nolan (Mercury) might agree, but. certainly the programme can offer far more insight than we are likely to get from the Sunday press as a Second Division club.

Most of all it presents the opportunity to bring Charlton closer to the supporters, something already achieved in different ways by the fanzines, Clubcall and the election campaign.

Used properly, it could become one of the most significant innovations in the club's history.



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
■ he team had to travel a thousand miles and play 5 matches in the space of ten days before enjoying a well deserved weeks holiday at Surfers Paradise which lived up to all expectations. The tour took place at the start of Australia's winter and the Charlton party were confronted with some of the worst weather imaginable including a couple of monsoons. But thankfully, as if reward for their efforts it changed for the better as they relaxed for the final week. It took the tour party two or three days to get over jet lag after their 23 hour flight from London to Sydney and the Journey certainly took a toll of them in the opening two matches both of which were drawn. The third game was abandoned because of one of those monsoons with Charlton a goal in front and the last two

Still further north Rockhampton for the fourth match at Ryan Park in overcast humid conditions against Central Queensland with Charlton running out 5-1 winners three of the goals coming in the last 15 minutes.
