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
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A word about contributions: "What can I send?"



An overview of Pearl Jam products for your collecting pleasure (includes partial PJ collectibles too!)

A bit about Merkin Ball...

Released December 5, 1995 on CD (U.S. Epic 34K 78199) and 7" vinyl (U.S. Epic 34-78199). Features 'I Got Id' (aka 'I Got Shit') and 'Long Road'. Pearl Jam have always operated in a democratic manner, therefore where three go in their names, there is Pearl Jam, even though Stone and Mike are absent from this production. To those of you who believe that Stone and Mike are Pearl Jam, you're out of luck. Brendan O'Brien was thrown in for good measure. Apparently, "merkin" is defined as "false hair for female genitalia". Why one would need an item of this nature is beyond us, unless you could get custom made merkins with, say, a Sonics logo shaved into it... Otherwise, a cool little single to have; our guess is that since Ed wasn't on Mirror Ball much, he had to make up for it.

Working Class Hero...

Working Class Hero: A Tribute to John Lennon was released in CD and cassette formats on October 24, 1995 (U.S. Hollywood Records). So what, you say? Well, our beloved Mad Season contributed to this compilation, recording a cover of 'I Don't Wanna Be A Soldier'. Imagine...

A couple of worthwhile publications have been released for your reading and gazing pleasure. Loser, The Real Seattle Music Story a softcover publication written by Clark Humphrey (retails for about \$16.00) features loads of black and white pictures of all your grungy faves, including pre-scene band Shadow (Mike in spandex-rock on!) and the ever photogenic Mother Love Bone (mama papa, talking to me). Also, Screaming Life by Charles Peterson focuses on the early 80's SubPop-type Seattle area bands, including Green River and Mother Love Bone, as well as Soundgarden, Nirvana and of course, PJ. It's a hardcover book and will set you back 35 big ones, but it does come with a compilation CD featuring Green River. Gotta have 'em!

RCA released a Jimi Hendrix tribute album late last year; one of the participants in the project was former PJ drummer Dave Abbruzzese. Dave is featured on two tracks of the release. Have you ever been experienced? I have.

Count your days with Pearl Jam

UK company Oliver Books has once again issued a Pearl Jam calendar (that makes three years in a row). One would think by 1996, the company would get a clue that Pearl Jam has FIVE members (count 'em), rather than just the one curly-haired singer guy that they think looks so good as a pin-up boy. Everyone's a comic...

The Pearl Jam story has once again been put into comic book form, this time put out by First Amendment Publishing out of Deer Park, NY. For a whopping \$3.50, you can follow the saga of our heroes in *Grunge Comics Presents The Pearl Jam Story*. The story takes us from the recording Surfer Ed's vocal demo to today's multi-platinum success. We were highly disappointed by the lack of capes, tights and mutants... what kind of comic is this? It's goofy, but, well...we bought it anyway. Buy one and color it in!

MAGnificent!

Some magazines that may be of interest - The August 1995 issue of the sort of obscure 20th Century Guitar (Seventh String Press •135 Oser Ave. • Hauppauge, NY 11788) featured a cover story on magnificent Mike McCready. Lots of Lance Mercer photos, good article. The coolest guy in San Pedro Mike Watt appears on the October 1995 cover of Bass Player. Watt talks about the making of Ball Hog and many other fascinating subjects....this man is a kick! Everyone should be talking Pedro Speak. Most importantly, the October 1995 issue of High Times magazine features a bunch of silly pictures of a red-eyed Stone Gossard (now we know where he got his name....I'll bet his real name is George [tee hee]), talking and toking with Weapon of Choice's Lonnie Marshall. This issue also brings us up to date on Brad/Satchel drummer Regan Hagar as well as checking in with Dave A. Spark it up!

MIKKUKBALL There was mirrorball in the Fillmore and Young used the image to describe how he put the album together: like a bunch of little squares or rectangular mirrors and you look in and it's a different thing in every one of 'em and it's twirling around. That's what's

happening with the record." "I saw an opportunity to do something and I just kept pushing to try and get it done," recalls Young. "I wanted to go to their turf because it was the easiest way to do it. I wanted to get as much on record as I could in the short amount of time before they went out on the road. The best way to do that was to use all of the people that they already know so that everybody feels good. I'm the only new person there. It was a refreshing change of pace for me. Nothing to stay on top

of, I was nobody's boss - it was just fine." Ask Young what drew him to Pearl Jam and he doesn't have to think. "Soul," he replies. "Besides being amazingly good musicians, they've got the big beat. There's a lot of force there ... "And youth? "Pearl Jam play like they're older than I am," he responds. "They play with a lot of wisdom. That's what I love about them: they've got all this energy with all this wisdom at the same time.

"The beauty of the record, for me, the thing that really gives it a depth, is who's playing and when. Where they decide to play is so great and shows so much more wisdom than their years. You see, there was no direction. There was not one word spoken to do with, y'know, 'You play here, you play there, let's do this, let's do that'. Nothin'. Not one word. We just started off, I'd play it a little bit on the guitar and show them the changes and then play it and sing it and by the fourth time, it was over.

"We'd do it and then we'd stop for a minute and people'd move their equipment around and then we'd come back in and do it again. And then you'd notice that one of the guys wouldn't be playing or somebody else would be playing it. Sometimes everybody was there, sometimes only three guys from the band, sometimes five, sometimes four, but we never talked about that. It was like they knew what they could do and it was really great.

Y'know, I think Pearl Jam's older than I am. Listen to the way they play. It's not a matter of age. To me they play with the wisdom you get over time. I don't know where they got it."

NEIL SPEAKS about Mirror Ball

"Well. I guess by just a natural progression of things." he says. "They played with me on a tour that I did with Booker T and the MGs a couple years ago. They sounded really good, and we were comfortable together. We just got to know one another, and they used to come out and jam with us at the end; we did "Rockin' In The Free World" a couple of times with them and a couple of times with both bands.

They've done a couple of Bridge [School] shows, which has been really nice. We sold out two days and made a lot of money for the kids and everything was really beautiful. And we just got into playing a little bit at my house together. I did this benefit for them. the Pro Choice benefit in Washington. DC. And they came to the Rock 'N' Roll Hall of Fame when Eddie inducted me into the deal there. and they heard me do one song with Crazy Horse that night, "Act Of Love" [now on Mirror Ball), which they really liked, and they learned it off of the tape, and the next night in Washington I did it with them, and it was great. It was really cool. And they really rocked it. So I said, 'God, we oughta cut that. I'd like to get it while it's hot, you know?' And Eddie had mentioned to me that they would like to go into the studio and do something, so we just did it. We decided to do it, we set it up and ten days later we were in the studio. It started from that one song, and I just kept coming up with more songs. And after four days we had it — four days in the studio over a two-week period. I think."

So Neil did all the songwriting and brought the songs to them to play? "Yeah. yeah. I just played the songs and everything just kinda fit in naturally. Sometimes, if we seemed to get a little bit disorganized, [producer] Brendan O'Brien would come in and tell us. "Do this and this and that and this." All I wanted to do was play and sing, and that's all they wanted to do, so Brendan would organize us. So that was real straight-ahead. There's nothing revolutionary in the form of the record. It's just good music where everybody was having a good time playing, and it was done really fast, which I like.

"And they're really good. They're excellent in the studio."

Most remarkable is how it came together feeling like a Neil Young record, almost like a Crazy Horse record. It seems like that band really opened up and played in a different slyle than it normally does. Very live, very loose

"Well, it was done that way." Neil nods. "It was done live. Singing and playing all at once, in a line, like we were on stage, in a big room with mikes, with monitors in the room and everything and live vocals. So it should sound like that. But they have a lot of energy and they were really up for playing with me. And I was excited to play with them. We knew we didn't have a lot of time. So all those things were kinda workin' for us. Heh."



Loosegroove was formed by musicians STONE GOSSARD, REGAN HAGAR (Satchel) and producer DENNIS HERRING (Throwing Muses, Cracker). The three set about forming the Loosegroove idea as part of an artist development label for some of the most innovative bands around America.

The Loosegroove label so far is home to six acts including Stone Gossard's own project BRAD, along with WEAPON OF CHOICE, PROSE AND CONCEPTS. CRITTERS BUGGIN', DEVILHEAD and the defunct MALFUNKSHUN. ALL SIX OF THESE DEBUT ALBUMS ARE OUT NOW.

BRAD - SHAME, Bradd, featuring both Stone Gossard, and the awesome vocal talent of Satchel's Shawn Smith, was described by RAW magazine as "a beautiful collection of ultra mellow songs that are perfect for lazy, hazy nights' KERRANG! awarded Shame 5 out of 5, while MUSIC WEEK simply called Shame - "a classic". If you missed this underground masterpiece first time round, buy this reissue now!





WEAPON OF CHOICE - Nut Meg Sez "Bozo The Town", Weapon Of Choice, subscribe to the musical style and feelosophy called "Nut"Meg", "Nut"Meg", is, simply
put, "Music untamed", Their "Parliament", inspired
album "NUT"MEG SEZ 'BOZO THE TOWN'", was made SKY magazine's Album of the Month, who described it as a complete blast". KERRANG! and RAW both awarded

PROSE AND CONCEPTS - Procreations. Prose And Concepts, Northwest America's foremost underground Hip Hop band, contain no less than five rappers. MOJO say their "sophisticated, poetry-driven sound" represents a new distinctive sound in the world of hip hop. All the hip hop publications have raved about Prose and Concepts and even KERRANGI admitted PROCREATIONS is "very impressive"





CRITTERS BUGGIN' - Guest. Critters Buggin's, alm is to "make music as much fun as possible" "Outright Weirdness Award" goes to Critters Buggin's "GUEST". Their schitzoid, jazz sound contains guest vocals from the exceptionally talented Shawn Smith (of Satchel, Brad and Pigeonhead fame) and led KERRANGI to call the album "Brilliant, bizarre and one of a kind", while RAW gave the album 4 out of 5.

DEVILHEAD - Your Ice Cream's Dirty. Devilhead, are a Godlike band from Washington whose five piece sound is hard edged relentless funk rock. Three of Devilhead joined members of Soundgarden in 1993 releasing a critically acclaimed album under the name Hater, MOJO said "YOUR ICE CREAM'S DIRTY" ranges from angular funk rock to deliberate, almost theatrical





MALFUNKSHUN - ReturnTo Olympus. Malfunkshun, a mere decade after their demise, have their debut album released. Malfunkshun mutated into Mother Love Bone who, with further line up changes, became Pearl Jam and are justifiably regarded as the Godfathers of the Seattle Sound. This compilation showcases the exceptional vocal talent of the late Andrew Wood.

After a year-long investigation done by the Justice Dept., Ticketmaster has been found to be conducting business within the bounds of U.S. anti-trust laws. Since the investigation was mounted at the urging of Pearl Jam, some journalists have taken to calling the decision Pearl Jam's "defeat". The consumer is the real defeated

party; what option to Ticketmaster do we have if we want to see our favorite bands play live?

Fortunately because we are fans of Pearl Jam, we do have an option. As a result of being dissatisfied with Ticketmaster's way of doing business, the band has undertaken the daunting task of arranging their own towns.

Ticketmaster's way of doing business, the band has undertaken the daunting task of arranging their own tours-finding safe, workable venues and distributing tickets through alternative sources (ETM and Fillmore). The process of booking a tour is a complex one; considerations such as venue size, safety, security, parking as well as legal issues are all arrangements the band had to handle themselves. Working out these details as well as finding a reasonably-priced, fair way of selling tickets proved to be very frustrating for Pearl Jam. Non-Ticketmaster venues were hard to find, heavily regulated and legally stifling. Manager Kelly Curtis made the band's struggle public, saying in June that it was "impossible to mount a tour without using (Ticketmaster)", even insinuating that the

band would go back to using the agency.

Pearl Jam's desire to do what is best for their fans seemed impossible to work out; yet the band persisted a tour was arranged despite the obstacles. Ticketmaster's exorbitant ticket service charges motivated Pearl Jam to create an alternative tour for their fans, yet our benefits from their struggle have turned out to be much greater than simply lower service charges. As a concertgoer regularly held hostage by Ticketmaster, I have had to budget from 3 to 10\$ over the cost of a concert ticket if I want to see a show. With Pearl Jam's self arranged tour, the fees were kept to \$2.50 in most cases, the extra charges clearly explained on the ticket stubs. No surprises! Also, the band's ticket distribution and sale has practically eliminated scalping at Pearl Jam shows. Phone sales allowing check payment made it easier for those without access credit cards to buy tickets. Bar codes and entry-point scanners prevent bootleg ticket rip-offs. More importantly, the fact that there were plentiful tickets for sale on the day of the show in a majority of the venues that Pearl Jam played made scalpers obsolete. Time and again we saw scalpers unloading tickets for under face value; why buy from a scalper when tickets are sold right at the door?

Our boys have taken a lot of shit as a result of the entire Ticketmaster ordeal, but the bottom line is that they have the courage of their convictions. Due to the complexity of planning, the longer tours that we have previously enjoyed from Pearl Jam may no longer be possible; short 4 or 5 date mini-tours seem to be the most manageable option for the band. In the end, it's the music that matters; Pearl Jam's struggle to play live for their fans on their terms only serves to make the music that much sweeter...

Once again, a monkey wrench in the system...

Concert bound PJ fans whose car radios were tuned to the low end of the dial have been treated to broadcasts from Monkey wrench radio, a traveling pirate FM station forefronted by Eddie blasting onto airwaves across the land. Transmitted mostly pre- & post-concert, Monkey wrench has featured a varied musical mix as well as treating listeners in some cities to live broadcasts of Pearl Jam shows. Chicago, Salt Lake City and San Diego are among the recent concerts broadcast. Throw your own wrench in the system - wanna hit the airwaves? Monkeywrench Radio gave us a suggested set-up..see the inside back cover of this issue so you can be your own DJ.

Never mind the bollocks, here's Bumrush!

Busy bee Mike McC has yet another side project to occupy his spare time and treat our ears! Mike and his punk rock loving bandmates in Bumrush played Seattle's tiny Lake Union Pub October 15. 'Dr. Ed Assner' (Mikey) plays lead guitars; Monkeywrencher James, aka 'Phelch Dunderhead' handles vocals; 'Vic Viking', a punk veteran who has played in The Germs & Circle Jerks amongst others is the drummer. (Vic can also be seen onstage with Pearl Jam setting fire to things and acting as Jack's drum tech - his name is Nicky Alexander!). Cryptically named Dick Ben Enya, rhythm guitarist, moonlights as PJ photographer extraordinaire Lance Mercer. Dan from Green Apple Quick Step rounds out the group, Known here as bassist Vague Dogma.

What started out as a punk concept band has actually seen the light of day, playing a free show at the 150 person capacity club. Bumrush has also been busy with some more recent gigs, opening for supergroup Neurotic Boy Outsider - a side band featuring former Sex Pistol Steve Jones, Guns and Roses members Matt Sorum and Northwest boy Duff McKagan, and on bass (SCREAM!-Kath) Duran Duran's John Taylor. The band passed through Seattle on January 12 at the Croc. What a thrill for punk loving Bumrush to open for a Sex Pistol! [I caught NBO when they were in San Francisco (hi it's me, Kath) a day before this and they were really cool! They did a lot of covers, knocking my socks off by opening with Duran tune Planet Earth. Yes, sad but true, I'll admit it; I am a recovering Durannie. Boo hoo that Bumrush only opened in Seattle though.]

Not stopping there, Bumrush did their own headlining gig at Moe's the next night. Is this the same bar that Homer Simpson frequents? Pour me a Flaming Moe... With all this gigging, can a rumored single and album be far behind? Only if they don't give us the bumrush! By the way, the word bumrush means - the forced ejection of

an undesirable person. Moshers beware! Know it, learn it, live it.

Pearl Jam contributes to Home Alive.

Mia Zapata, slain singer of Seattle band The Gits, was the inspiration for Home Alive, a CD benefiting the organization of the same name. The group of Seattle area artists such as Nirvana, the Wilson sisters, The Presidents of the USA and Pearl Jam are featured in the double CD out Feb. 20. Spoken word by Jello Biafra, Jim Carrol and Bobby Miller (Keep Your Mouth Off My Sister, heard previously on 'Self Pollution Radio'). The Pearl Jam track will be 'Leaving Here'. This Motown classic was written by the legendary songwriting team Holland-Dozier-Holland; PJ were inspired to perform this track by a cover of the song done by the High Numbers. (For you young 'uns, the High Numbers went on to call themselves The Who).

Friends of Mia Zapata, who, in July '93, was brutally raped and murdered after leaving a bar alone, formed Home Alive to call attention to issues of violence against women. The organization offers inexpensive self defense classes, safety seminars, and open forums on issues such as confidence and self esteem. The organization's

function is mainly to raise funds to promote public awareness of the brutal facts:

• Every nine seconds in America a woman is physically abused by her husband or boyfriend.

•42% of all murdered women are killed by current or ex-male partners.

• Every five minutes in America a woman is raped.

•One out of every eight adult women has been the victim of forcible rape.

•It is estimated only 16% of sexual assaults are reported to the police.

Home Alive's goal is not just to gain support of the Seattle project; they want people in other cities to use them as a model to start their own community awareness group. People interested in developing a similar program in their own area may apply to Home Alive for starter funds. NBC's Unsolved Mysteries broadcast a reenactment of Mia Zapata's rape and murder on 2-2-96, in hopes of generating leads that will bring her killer or killers to justice. Accompanying himself on guitar, Eddie warmed up the crowd at Spartan Stadium in San Jose, CA Nov. 4 with a mournful tune featuring the phrase 'Dead Man Walking'. Sean Penn plays a convicted killer on death row in the currently released film "Dead Man Walking" directed by Tim Robbins. The movie's soundtrack features a collaboration by Eddie and Pakastani Qawwali singer Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan on 2 tracks, 'The Face of Love' and 'Long Road'.

According to an interview with Robbins in People Magazine, he sent several musicians a rough edit of the movie and a copy of the book (written by real life nun Sister Helen Prejean) along with a note that read, If it inspires anything, great; if not, that's cool too. Enjoy the movie. "Most (musicians) came back with songs. I'd be sitting editing the movie, and cassettes would arrive. I felt like I was just getting these incredible gifts in the mail." Robbins explained how the Vedder/Khan duet happened... "Nusrat is a legend in his part of the world. The songs he sings have been passed down from generation to generation. you hear the roots of all music in them, from jazz to gospel to scat. Vedder is a big fan. It turned out Nusrat was in New York on tour when we were doing the score, so we set aside a day, and Eddie and Nusrat each brought in songs. They became the duets. For me, those moments with Eddie and Nusrat were among the most remarkable." Indeed.


Sony 550, arranged the silent auction, to be conducted on-line throughout the month of January. Proceeds will go into a For Squirrels Medical Fund that Sony established, with any additional donations being funneled to the Sweet Relief Musician's Fund.

Pearl Jam have been monitoring and participating in the drive to preserve a sacred Apache site atop Arizona's Mt. Graham since performing a benefit for the cause back in November 1994. The University of Arizona has been enacting a plan to build a third telescope on the mountain, which would disturb sacred Apache burial grounds. A current Senate appropriations bill had been introduced to award U of A funding to build the telescope; President Clinton vetoed the bill, buying the Mount Graham and Apache Survival Coalitions time to garner support. Pearl Jam made their support of the Apache's struggle known by sending a letter of thanks to President Clinton for vetoing appropriations (that's government talk for money, folks).

"We urge you to continue your efforts to protect their sacred sites through the current budget negotiations,"

read the letter, which was signed by all five band members.

And Footsteps urges you to follow Pearl Jam's example by getting involved in your local communities. Sometimes a simple gesture that you may not think twice about can be a miracle to those in need. R.E.M. brought Randy and I together many moons ago, and their commitment to giving something back to their communities was also an inspiration. We sure can pick 'em, eh? The phrase we read over and over in different R.E.M. literature, <Think Global, Act Local> is a good one to live by. Get involved!

"We didn't work with Pearl Jam in the studio," says B. "They sent over some shit, we rhymed over it, mixed it and sent it back. We worked in the studio with Sonic Youth, though. We got to get high with them. It was different [working with them] because they're used to being around musicians, and we're not really musicians - we're writers and rappers."







Kath: What's your favorite color?

Mike: Oh no... Kath: Just kidding.

Ran: What does "Pearl Jam" mean?

Mike: Oh nooo.... All right. That's it.

Kath: Okay, first question. I'm gonna get the hard one outta the way first. Did you ever get to the point where you just

said "fuck it, I'm not doing this anymore with PJ"? Mike: With this?

Kath: Yeah. Mike: Aahhh....

Kath: 'cos I know you guys had just gone through so much

stuff and you had gone through personal stuff...

Mike: Sometimes. Probably when I was really in my addiction, when I was doing alot of drugs and drinking alot. I think I was just more paranoid all the time so... I never wanted to give it up 'cos I love this band, but it always seems it could end tomorrow, but I hope it doesn't.

Kath: Do you think that the lines of communication are

staying open between everybody in the band?

Mike: Yeah. They're very open, they're very good.

Kath: And You're all trying to keep that? Mike: Oh yeah, yeah. It's a constant thing.

Kath: You gotta really work at it. Mike: Yeah, like any relationship.

Kath: Do you have a dream technology - as a guitar player, like a guitar that you want like in Wayne's World - "I gotta have that guitar!"?

Mike: Ah god... I wanted to get Jimi Hendrix' guitar, but it cost too much money or some fucking doctor bought it or something. Or maybe a '59 Les Paul, like Jimmy Page. But I don't know, I'm pretty psyched....

Kath: You don't seem too terribly attached to your guitars up on stage - crash, setting it on fire...

Mike: Well, I'm trying to cut 'em down, especially after seeing the Ramones. They only use two guitars so I felt kinda stupid changing on every song.

Kath: Do you see yourself doing this in 20 years and being in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame?

Mike: Oh, that's a good question! I have no idea. If we could age gracefully like Neil Young, or Tom petty or the Ramones, then yes. But if not, I can't see it. I have no idea! Kath: It's hard to detach yourself and say "I'm not being the Rolling Stones, Pink Floyd"...

Mike: Yeah, I don't think I ever want to do that. That would be beating it to death and hopefully that's not going to happen.

Kath: You had alot of opportunity to learn alot from Neil, being out on the road with him.

Mike: Yeah, I didn't wanna like step all over his leads and everything he does 'cos he's like the master of that, but after a while, I kinda wanted to a little bit.

Ran: You did pretty good tonight.

Mike: Oh, thank you.

Kath: We haven't really heard anything of those shows. Did you do alot of jamming at the end of the songs? Like how Arc is?

Mike: We did feedback. We had our little feedback sessions and Neil would scream in to his guitars, pickups and things like that. I would try to have to out do him, which was pretty fucking hard.

Kath: Like dueling banjoes... Mike: Yeah, dueling feedback.

Kath: We heard you went into the crowd.

Mike: I did at one show. It was Czechoslovakia. I jumped into my amp and then Neil kinda like grabbed me and then I just said "Fuck it" and just went for it. It was fun for a second

Kath: And how was the Czech crowd?

Mike: They were amazing. Totally passionate and very cool. Kath: We have alot of Polish fans and they are just so hungry for anything...

Mike: Right - Poland, Hungary.... Kath: Well, that's a good joke.

Mike: Yeah, it was.

Kath: I'm the Queen of bad jokes! Is it still as much fun for you to play live with Pearl Jam? These shows were amazing

and it seems like everyday got better and better. Mike: You guys aren't biased, are you?

Ran: It was because of you.

Mike: Oh, come on!

Kath: Your emotions have really... everybody has seemed to be picking up on it.

Mike: well, I think I'm fully more confident now, especially from doing the Neil tour and being clean. It's helped that out alot and I just hope.... These shows have been so fucking great, I just wish we kept playing a little more.

Kath: I noticed at the end of 'Yellow Ledbetter', you got a rhythm thing going. Have you learned from Stone? Do you see yourself doing more rhythm, pick it up from Stone on that?

Mike: Yeah, yeah. When he does leads I'll definitely try to do more rhythm. I was originally a rhythm guitar player, in Shadow.

Ran: Do you sing on the new album?

Mike: Umm... no. No, no, no. I'll let Eddie do that!

Kath: You sang great!

Mike: I don't know. Maybe. Sheesh....

Kath: You're not a croaker, you're more a crooner than a croaker.

Mike: NOT. I totally won't be. I fully don't have the confidence to do that.

Ran: He doesn't want to one up Eddie.

Mike: OH <raspberry sound> the day that'll happen!

Kath: He seems like he wants to duel with you a little bit on the guitar solos.

Mike: Yeah, he gets into it. He's a good guitar player - he's getting way better.

Kath: Along those lines, do you see yourself writing your own songs with lyrics and everything?

Mike: I write lyrics, but I always look back at them and think they're pretentious as hell. I write music all the time. I write alot, just because I have confidence to put a song together now. Just by myself alot.





Everybody's talking about Pearl Jam. Far be it from us to keep them quiet. Here are a few choice words from a few choice folks.

Eddie Van Halen • Rolling Stone, 4-6-95

Do You try to keep up on what's going on musically?

Not really. I'm not shut off from things, but whatever's out there doesn't change what I do. Rock's changed so many times since we started. We got signed when punk and disco were big. It didn't influence me. I love the Peter Gabriel album So, but that didn't make me try to write like him. I like Tori Amos, Soundgarden and this band, Live, but I don't write like any of them, either. I don't know where my shit comes from - I almost get into a meditative trance. But wherever it comes from, it does not sound like Pearl Jam or Soundgarden or anyone else. For the last four years all I've been listening to is Sesame Street, Mickey Mouse and children's songs. So if anything, I'd probably start writing Raffi songs.

So You don't worry about being relevant when bands like Green Day and the Offspring are celebrating punk?

I just think a lot of bands out there ain't going to last until they get better. On the other hand, I might be a better player than some of these people, but what they're doing speaks as well as what I do. At the same time there's a hardness about how I play that is as grunge as what they do. I just articulate a little better. And I play loud, too. I don't think what Eddie Vedder or Anthony Kiedis do is going to make Sammy think, "I better do this now."

How about someone like Stone Gossard, from Pearl Jam?

I like them, but the guitar playing in particular never really hit me. I like Pearl Jam and Soundgarden, but I don't even know who the guitarists are.

The scene is Pensacola, Florida, and the band are supporting Pearl Jam at a benefit for Rock For Choice, the pressure group they helped set up to fight the mercilessly militant anti-abortion movement currently causing bloodshed and havoc at clinics across the USA. Singer/guitarist Donita Sparks and Drummer Dee Plakas take up the story:

Donita: "Some religious fanatics found out which hotel rooms we were in, and were shoving anti-abortion literature under our doors."

Dee: "They were handing out home-made pamphlets that said 'PEARL JAM = SATAN'! And there was another one that said something like 'Get a front row seat for the hottest concert in everlasting damnation and hell.' I liked that one." "It was really creepy, " adds bassist Jennifer finch, "because it was in a recruiting area for very violent antiabortion activists. We were in the town where Dr. David Gunn had been shot by Michael Griffin a year prior to the concert. There was a lot of concern for the safety of concertgoers and artists. Pearl Jam brought in a special FBI agent to protect the building."

Courtney Love, Hole • Request, 8-95

On Pearl Jam's Eddie Vedder: He tried to make friends with me. As Kurt would say [sarcastically] 'He's a good guy'. A little savvy, a little calculating, more than people know. I should be nice to him by all rights, but I can't because it's dishonorable because Kurt hated him."

Mudhoney on their 2 1/2 year absence Kerrang!, 6-95

But what kept 'em so long? As a band that once threatened to go back to college just as they signed a major deal, have they been victims of their own untogetherness for the last coupla years?

"Well, considering what's happened to Kurt Cobain and Eddie Vedder, I would consider our absence a blessing!" states Matt, with all the diplomacy of Adolf Hitler.

Well, we finally pulled it off and the kid met Eddie. He ended up giving the guy the chain from around his neck. He told him, 'I remember your brother, man, he was cool.' He treated this kid like a long lost friend. For an artist to go to that length is unimaginable."

Dan Glendining of UK group Headswim Kerrang!, 6-10-95

K!: You were signed fairly soon after Clovis joined in '92. Were you ready for all the record label attention?

Dan: "Not really! I suppose development deals are rare these days. Record companies didn't expect Rock bands to be big on their first albums until Pearl Jam happened. That sort of changed everything. Now it's all f**king units. "A lot of people did try and pin the 'British Pearl Jam' thing on us, but I think they're getting bored with trying, because we just play gigs and blow people away. It's like, F**k off!"

K!: Do you feel any affinity with either Eddie Vedder or Kurt Cobain?

Dan: "Not Vedder, but Cobain wrote f**kin' brilliant songs. I don't have much in common with Pearl Jam. I like Nirvana for their simplicity and the way they did things, although we're on more of a psychedelic groove trip."

Scott Weiland, Stone Temple Pilots Rolling Stone, 6-15-95

on the Consumers Against Unfair Ticketing coalition

On past tours, STP have done their part by charging lower ticket prices and absorbing the loss themselves, and though they aren't personally involved in the coalition, they back their manager's efforts.

"I think it's admirable the way Pearl Jam stuck their necks out," Weiland says, "but I think it might have been a little bit more effective if there had been a coalition put together beforehand, because they're not the lone horses in their feelings about the whole ticket bullshit."

Tim Armstrong, Rancid • Details, 7-95

Tim is bouncing around my room at the Paramount. Earlier in the evening, Eddie Vedder told Tim he was worried about him. Eddie had just played a show at Tramps, a club in Chelsea, as a member of Mike watt's backup band. Tim had only met Eddie once before. Eddie said he could tell that Tim liked to be treated as a person, which would soon become impossible; Eddie said they don't treat him like that anymore. Tim can't believe Eddie even knows who the hell he is, let alone be worried about him. He says he's worried about Eddie. He likes Eddie. He says Eddie reminds him of his brother Jeff. Eddie said he would call Tim later in the week to explain himself further.

It isn't surprising that Eddie Vedder would know who Tim is, because the same Epic executive who signed Pearl Jam, Michael Goldstone, offered Rancid \$1.5 million last year. On the last day of a week of meetings, Goldstone, attempting to impress the band, dyed his hair blue.

Mark Arm of Mudhoney • Faces, 6-95

Mudhoney is sometimes mentioned by more high visibility Seattle musicians, like Eddie Vedder, as having been slighted on the reward-o-meter thus far in their 7-year long career. In a recent *Spin* interview, Vedder expressed his annoyance on the subject. "I can be around somebody from a band like Mudhoney, or I think about a band like the Fastbacks, and I feel like, why aren't they reaping the benefits of success? They're played in bands and have recorded music for a much longer period than we have."

What's Arm's take on the matter? "Well, just because you've played in a rock band for a long time doesn't mean there's some automatic reward," he chuckles. "That's just a ridiculous idea, 'I've put in my time and now it's my turn." His answer isn't a slam on Vedder, more so a blunt statement of fact. In fact, Arm and Vedder are neighbors in Seattle, virtually living down the street from one another. Arm adds, "It's just his way of plugging us."

Lars Ulrich of Metallica • Kerrang!, 8-27-94

"I went to see Pearl Jam up in Seattle, which was their big homecoming gig. I was up there hanging out with my Dad and it was, 'Okay, let's go and see what this is all about'. There was absolutely no connection between the band and the audience. There's no interaction, there's no kind of vibe. "The band are just doing there thing, half of them are just hanging abound looking at the lighting rig! Eddie Vedder's there with his back to the audience and the audience are just out there getting what they're getting out of it, but there's no rock 'n' roll vibe there, as corny as that sounds."

Daniel Johns of Silverchair Rolling Stone, 8-24-95

"At the start we were really influenced by Pearl Jam, and I was trying to sing like Eddie Vedder. Now we don't like them, either. It'll only take one more album for people to realize we don't sound like any of those [Seattle] bands."

Dave Grohl of Nirvana Foo Fighters (Yes, people, it's time to move on) Details, 10-95

Dave had a recurring dream about Eddie Vedder: Dave and his sister would be at the zoo, and Eddie, dressed in silver, would be trying to disguise himself. The dream would end with Eddie sucking on Dave's finger.

"Yeah, you need to stop this. I mean, what's going to come of it? Pearl Jam will want you to do their video and you will have 'made it'? Fuck that, man, forget it."

(Speaking of the reason for more new bands) Part of the reason is what's the alternative? People can't afford to go to college, they can't get jobs, and it's not hip to be a straight person; it's really hip to be Eddie Vedder or Courtney Love."

Sung during jam between songs: "Cook em, just to see the look on their face, cook 'em just to see the look on their face..." Anthony (to Flea): What was the last concert you saw? Flea: Queen. 
Two years ago there was this big show at Carnegie Hall. It was a tribute to the music of Pete Townsend sung by Roger Daltrey. It was a real sleeper--literally. The high points of the evening (was) definitely Eddie Vedder, who came out with an electric guitar and sang three Who songs by himself.

Daltrey came in and I gave him a copy of 'Acid Eaters' for his birthday, with a birthday message inside. Then Eddie Vedder walked in with all the paparazzi trailing after him. When Roger Daltry saw the paparazzi, he went over and put his arm around Eddie to make it look like they were buddy-buddy--everything Eddie hates. So Eddie grabbed me and pulled me into the picture as well, which made me feel pretty good. After the smoke cleared, he came and sat down next to me. I didn't know what to expect because you hear a lot of shit, but actually he's a real nice guy. I was pleasantly surprised, he's down to earth, grounded, and a real rock and roll fan. A real Who fan who got wangled into performing this night.

He was telling me this story about his first time in New York City. It was winter and being a surfer, it reminded him of this song - he couldn't think of the title. I said, "New York's A Lonely Town" by The Tradewinds. He said, "Yeah, that's it." So on my way to Phoenix, Arizona for our two shows with Pearl Jam, I decided to surprise him with a little gift, I figured it would kind of give him a kick.

I called my editor about locating the original vinyl single, and...(she found a copy). The record was the original vinyl single of "New York's A Lonely Town", on the Red Bird label. The real deal. We arrived to do a soundcheck at Veterans Memorial Coliseum...Eddie came over and was real warm and friendly. Really himself, no bullshit, no airs, no crap. So I said, "I got a gift for you."

I told him I remembered the story he told me at the Daltrey party, and I gave him the single. He was real touched that I remembered the incident. He said that having The Ramones open up for Pearl Jam was a little strange for them, implying it should be the other way around, and that having us on the show was "gracing them" And both John and I told him that we really appreciated them asking us on. And both John and I told him that they were the first band of that magnitude to ask us to be on their shows. He told John that it was a "dubious honor", and being such a big Ramones fan, it would take some getting used to.





It all started on a Tuesday night. A local radio station was giving away free tickets to see Pearl Jam in Denver. You had to be the ninth caller to win. I'd been trying for a few days so, when the phone started to ring I thought I might have a chance at winning. The d.j. picked up the phone and said that I was the ninth caller. Of course I was shocked and couldn't really speak. Well my mother had to accept the tickets for me because I'm not 18. The radio station was going to pay for the P.J. tickets, the airplane tickets, and the hotel we were going to be staying at. They also gave us \$50 for transportation NOT ENOUGH but I was very thankful.

We were to leave on the morning of the 19th. My sister decided to take us to the airport (BIG MISTAKE). Halfway to the airport the fan belt in her car broke. We couldn't find any place open that could help us. My mother called her friend in Gig Harbor and they came to pick us up. Our flight was scheduled to leave at 8:25 A.M. and we arrived at the airport at 8:20 A.M.!!! I ran through the airport to our gate, but the flight attendant told us that the plane was closed!!! They explained to us that they could get us on the next flight, but it would arrive in Denver at 8:00 P.M. The concert started at 7:00 P.M. so, we told them that that wouldn't work. They said that they might have a couple of extra seats left on the plane so, we went down the ramp to the plane. There was only one seat left on the plane. Frankly my biggest fear in this world is flying on a plane. I had never ridden one, and was never planing on ridding one. For Pearl Jam I'll do anything. My mother gave me the plane tickets, P.J. tickets, some money, and told me to get on the plane. We didn't have much time to think, but before you know I was on the plane heading for Phoenix. The only seat left on the plane was in first class so that's where I sat. You have to admit riding a plane for the first time in first class is pretty cool. There I was in first class on my way to Denver and not knowing what was going to happen once I got there.

Well, I got to Phoenix and caught my flight to Denver ON TIME!! We landed in Denver and I was walking off the plane and my mother was standing there. Of course I was shocked, but it ended up that she got a strait flight from Seattle to Denver. We met up with some other KISW winners (Glen and Sherry) at the Denver airport (good thing too). If we hadn't met them we wouldn't have been able to even get to the concert. The airport was 40 min. from our hotel (The Raddisson Greystone Castle), and it took forever for it to come and pick us up. We got to the hotel at 6:00 and got ready really fast. The hotel was another hour from where the actual concert was. Glen and Sherry had a friend living in Denver so, their friend (Sara) ended up taking us to the concert.

We got to Red Rocks at 7:15. The concert had already started. Bad Religion was opening the concert so, I got to see a little bit of their set. I thought they were really good. My mother, Glen, Sherry, and Sara headed for the back, but not me. I was right in the front dead center. Bad religion ended their set and it took a while for Pearl Jam to come out but they did. Eddie made his appearance by ridding a red bananaseat bike on the stage to his mic. The crowd started to scream and everybody crowded down closer to the stage. The first words that came out of Eddie's mouth were "This place sucks!" Then they kicked off the concert with "Go". Next they went right into "Last Exit". I couldn't believe that I was standing there in Denver thousands of miles from home listening to the best band ever, and enjoying the hell out of it.

I was very impressed on the lighting of the stage. Since the stage is made out of huge towering red rocks the lights that were reflected on them ended up looking awesome. I thought It was gorgeous when they shined the blue lights on the band and the purple lights against the rocks in the background. The band played under a huge arrangement of candle like structures. I thought they blended well with all of the lights and scenery.

Then after more songs the tone of the crowd went from intense to mellow. Once I heard the first few notes of the next song I knew it was "Black." Everybody got out their lighters and were swaying them around. It was one of the best versions of "Black" that I have ever heard even though, Eddie messed up on it a little bit. I know this sounds corny but, I could have left the concert right after that song was sung knowing that I would have been completely satisfied. Eddie told the crowd that his throat was hurting maybe because the altitude was so different because we were up so high. You couldn't even tell though because every song sounded great. They played "Immortality" sometime later and I thought that Mike did an awesome job. He took over the whole stage with his guitar solo. He was HOT, no one could stop this wild man from creating the music that he was creating. I couldn't help myself I had to scream MIKE! Stone and Jeff were rockin out too. Don't forget Jack, the sweat covered monster in the back. I know lots of people say this but the most annoying thing of the whole night was that a girl right next to me kept screaming EDDIE the whole fricking time. I wanted to turn and strangle her, but I didn't. Ya, I screamed Eddie a few times, but this girl wouldn't shut up. Screaming is all right, but when it's at such a high pitch right in my ear I get pissed. Well anyway, I remember at one point the light was shining on the front of the crowd. Eddie asked the people who controlled the lights to shine them on the back of the crowd. They did. Then Eddie asked them to turn off the lights in the front, but to leave the lights on in the back so that he could see the people. They never did accomplish his second request, but that didn't stop him. He continued to just look around at the fans toward the back of the crowd for what seemed like forever.

Well, like all good things you know they have to come to an end. Yes it was over. They played for about two hours, but it was over. The crowd was shouting PEARL JAM, but they never came back. They were throwing picks into the crowd and I was hoping to I neatre in Seattle on February 5, but I wasn't lucky enough this time. Well, all the running around and close calls that happened that day were well worth the chance to see Pearl Jam live. I will definitely never forget such a great Pearl Jam concert.

Out of pure excitement and anticipation, I arrived at noon at Cal Expo and took my place in line for the 7:30 Pearl Jam/Bad Religion show. The bright sunlight of the upper-ninety degree weather grew to be quite tiresome after being exposed to it for several hours, but the friendly attitudes of the other fans in line and relief in the forms of water and soda brought by a local radio station made the situation more tolerable. And, nothing could completely dampen my spirits, as I was thrilled to once again have the honor of seeing Pearl Jam live after going to one of the Bridge School shows last October.

At approximately 5:30 the Cal Expo staff began letting us into the amphitheatre. The process they selected for this task was not only the most disorganized and downright stupid method imaginable, it also infuriated me greatly. At first, a staff member told all of us to get back into our single file line against a fence outside the amphitheatre grounds, in order to insure that cutters, many of whom had begun circling the area, would not meet success. Then, the same staff member told all of us in line to fill up the entire pathway that existed between the fence and low, white barricades set about ten feet away from it, a decision that led to all the cutters and people from further back in line being able to pass many others, including myself. Then, the staff people began to slowly back up, letting this mob progress slowly forward in such a manner that many people yelled "Moo!" as we were herded and trampled up to the entrance gates.

I still ended up in the first couple rows of the pit, but this being a new and frightening experience for me, by the time Pearl Jam took the stage I was in the last few rows of it. I was able to remain fairly close and had a wonderful view during Bad Religion's set, aside from their opening song, in which I was utterly smashed to smithereens. Bad Religion did prove to be a talented and entertaining, although a bit monotonous, opening act, helped along by lead singer Greg Graffin's deadpan comments in between songs. When a beach ball that the crowd had been tossing around was taken by a guard, Graffin demanded that the beach ball be thrown back in to the audience, siting that it had cost the band five dollars and that a beach ball was a great way for an opening band to make it appear as though the crowd was going wild for them. After Bad Religion left the stage, I was disappointed to see all of these tall guys stepping in front of me, not to mention the fact that I had gum in my hair. So, my view was somewhat obstructed throughout PJ's performance and I was forced out to the far-right portion of the pit, making Stone stand out immensely in his glowing white shirt and Mike look like a distant memory. Jack was totally obstructed from view.

The band began playing around 9:00, the sun not having completely set, and opened, as expected, with "Release." It did not have quite the emotional impact as it might have had in darkness, but it was still beautiful. Soon the sun did disappear, and the lightbulbs on the large,

antique chandelier hanging above the band came alive with color. There were also a few lamps on stage, one with a red shade and candles on top of it. The most striking moment of the night for me came during "Animal," where the curtains behind the band shone with a wonderful green and the large lamp with the candles, which stood on an amp to Jack's right, stood out in a brilliant red. Tremor Christ featured the repetition of the line "gorgeous was his savior, sees her drowning in his wake." The first go-around was a little off, so Eddie promptly said, "Let's try that again," and it was repeated flawlessly. "Jeremy" was completely different, hardly resembling its former-self, without the complete lyrics and having the line "picking on the boy" repeated.

From what I could see, Stone seemed the most subdued, just rocking with the music and standing near the front of the stage. Mike was possibly the most excited, swinging himself around and letting his guitar fly around with him during "Not For You" and smoking a cigarette while playing "Dissident." I think that he had a light-blue t-shirt on, and his hair seemed to have gotten yet again shorter, looking almost choir-boyish from where I stood. Jeff was his usual self, with his backwards baseball cap, which flew off during "Evenflow," his dark vest and pants, and his trademark movements. Eddie began the show wearing a blue jacket but quickly discarded it in all the heat, exposing his light green t-shirt. Jack appeared to have a light colored t-shirt on, but that was all that I could see of him.

I think that the song after "Corduroy" was the new song that I've been hearing so much about, "Lukin," which was fast paced and short. "Evenflow" featured some wild jumping around by Eddie, as he practically fell to the ground with dizziness. After "Daughter," the band addressed the issue of all the shoes and other debris being flung on stage at an alarming rate. Stone joked "Okay, we got enough stuff. You can stop throwing now," and then exclaimed, "Look at all the stuff!" A new song followed "Rearviewmirror," and I couldn't understand any of the lyrics. Eddie did introduce it by saying that everyone on stage was pro-choice, and that the song was about choices of another kind. It was perhaps one of the band's hardest songs. The Sacramento Bee later reported that the song's title was "Habit." The set was closed with "Blood," which Eddie said was "one thing we all got in common."

The band became even more vocal during the encore. Eddie came out and said "If there are any young entrepreneurs out there, I think we could help you open up a thrift shop with all the shit we got up here." He then listened to requests being shouted up from the pit, and he considered playing "Dirty Frank." He said that they had tried playing that recently and that it hadn't turned out very well, so he said they'd play a song they wrote that morning. "Better Man" was the song. After a rousing rendition of "Sonic Reducer," in which Eddie did this great dance during Stone's solo, Eddie asked the crowd "Is it always this fucking hot here in Sacramento?" Shouts of "yes"--an answer which I can definitely confirm as the truth--went up from all over the amphitheatre. "Porch" was planned to be the last song, but the band decided to come out for one more number. Eddie told the crowd that they were a "good group" and that Mike was going to play a little for them. "Yellow Ledbetter" was of course the song.

PEARL JAM-NEIL YOUNG SAN FRANCISCO JUNE 24,1995

Last April 18, I noticed that there was an envelope with the Ten Club return address in my mailbox. A very welcomed letter indeed! Inside was information on Pearl Jams upcoming tour and the chance to reserve two tickets before they went on sale to everyone else. I sent away for tickets for the Boreal Ski Resort, thinking that it would be great to see Pearl Jam in the beautiful Sierra Nevada mountain range. Sadly this was not to be because of heavy snows this past winter. My next choice was for the Polo Field in San Francisco. I have been going to concerts held there ever since I was fifteen in 1972. I have many good memories of good music at the Polo Field. Seeing Pearl Jam there would be cool. Two weeks before the concert, I received the tickets through the mail. They had the image of a blue bug with the words Pearl Jam swirled through the body against a brown background; having that classic psychedelic art look. I was glad to get to keep the ticket stub to add to my treasures.

On the day of the concert, the weather was quite warm, probably in the high 90's. My husband and I rode his Harley; we live 25 miles away and the ride there was memorable with the anticipation of the day ahead. We were on our way to see Pearl Jam-YEA! The traffic when we arrived in San Francisco was a mess. There were men walking the freeway selling Pearl Jam T shirts to the cars stuck in traffic. Being as we rode the motorcycle, we were able to drive between the cars and arrive sooner. We parked near the entrance and I changed into my shorts very happy and excited to be there that day.

Golden Gate Park, where the Polo Field is located, is very green with many towering trees and surrounding grassy areas. Walking up a small hill and down into the Polo Field was an impressive sight. There was more then just the stage to see. One of the things that I thought was really cool were these towers with four sides of messages and images for the masses to reflect upon. The messages I remember were Welcome ~Take one second to think twice ~She said creativity is what matters most and I wonder if you will think of me when we are through? The images were of smiling children, a bullet, a blue handgun and a red headed fairy girl, dressed in green, running through the woods. There were white flags, a huge white tent with incense burning, white carnations for the taking, do it yourself silk-screen T-shirts in your choice of colors and to the left of the stage, a giant golden faced astronaut, his right hand raised in greetings. I thought that Pearl Jam had done a lot to enhance the feelings of the day. Thank You.

By the time Pearl Jam came on stage it was extremely hot. "Last Exit" was the first song played. Then they went on to play: "Spin The Black Circle" "Go" "Animal" "Tremor Christ" "Couduroy" and "Not For You." The stage became a thick haze of dust kicked up by the moshers. I was very happy to have Pearl Jams most wonderful music reverberate within my soul as only live music can do.

After "Not For You" Eddie said he had something serious he wanted to talk about. He went on to say that he had gone to the hospital emergency room because he had been very sick vomiting during the early morning hours of the night before and that he was not

feeling well. Eddie said Neil Young was going to come play and he would be back if he could. It was sudden and unexpected. I felt sorry for Eddie because it was so hot, he was sick with a shitty flu and he was so far from home. As Pearl Jam left, so that the stage could be set up for Neil to join them; the energy of the crowd dissipated into the heat of the day, not to return.

I had hoped that Neil Young would be there that day. I think its so very awesome that the guys from Pearl Jam whose music and ideals hold a big place in my heart, should become friends and make music with Neil who has been my very favorite musician and lyricist ever since I was a young hippy, nature girl, listening to "Cowgirl In The Sand" way back in 1971 When Jeff, Stone, Mike, Jack and Neil came on stage. Neil said that Eddie was lying on the floor very sick. I think the first song played was "Green Country" from the not yet released "Mirror Ball." Then they played "Act Of Love," 'Throw Your Hatred Down," Powderfinger," "Scenery" and "Rockin' In The Free World." Neil played solo the songs "Needle And The Damage Done" and " Hey Hey My ." Jeff, Stone, Mike and Jack joined Neil again for the songs"Down By The River," "Downtown," and Cortez The Killer. "Neil said that Eddie was suppose to sing a verse on the next song, but since Eddie was so sick, Neil would have to sing "Peace And Love" by himself... Together Pearl Jam and Neil Young worked their magic well. I felt myself to be a very lucky girl to be there that day. They thanked everyone for coming. Jeff said that they would try to come back in the future. Then they left the stage for a few minutes; coming back to play "Rockin' In The Free World" once again

By this time many people had left. It was really weird and unsettling to hear the selfish talk of a lot of people afterwards. They spoke as if Eddie had done them wrong, how they wanted a refund and other crap like that. Their attitude was disgusting, showing little regard for Eddie. Sure it was a drag that Eddie was sick. (Even more so for him.) Its just one of those things that happen in life. I thought Eddie showed a lot of consideration by even coming on stage to sing for us.. All of those unhappy people missed out because they did not open their hearts to enjoy the music performed that day.

Someday I hope to see Pearl Jam again. It would be truly great to see them with others who respect and appreciate the gift of music and thoughts that Pearl Jam has gave to us these last few years. I feel very fortunate to have experienced Eddie, Jeff, Stone, Mike, Jack and Neil's music on that hot summer day. A happy experience I will remember forever.

ETM was right; it was a roller coaster ride, but that's all right. I finally got to see PJ live! I was beginning to despair. I received the Ten Club mailing for tix late (I live in N.J., that's probably why) and all dates except Chicago were listed. I chose Milwaukee because it was the nearest east. ETM said tix (1 for me, 1 for my daughter) would be mailed 10 days before the concert. Being a firm believer in Murphy's Law, I didn't order plane tix, figuring I'd wait until I actually had them in hand. It took ETM forever to cash the check. Then, disaster! EV sick! tour canceled! I received the tix (the most beautiful ones I've ever seen - big, bronze - they reminded me of the golden ticket in Willie Wonka) the same day I heard the tour was canceled. Heavy irony. Then - a Miracle! Milwaukee and Chicago are a go! I got the last 2 seats to and from Milwaukee from Newark for that weekend, landing Friday, Leaving Sunday.

The hotel was minutes from the airport - that's OK - Milwaukee doesn't get the kind of air traffic we do. Saturday AM, I asked the hotel desk about the shuttle to Summerfest. "Oh, we didn't order the shuttle this year," she said. "But you can drive..."

Great. Now I had to rent a car - luckily, the airport was 5 minutes away - got a car, drove to Milwaukee following the Summerfest red smiley face signs to the parking area.

As we walked from the car, I saw the amphitheater looming ahead. There was loud music coming from it. I stopped transfixed. Rising above the guitars was EV's voice! The sound check was going on. My daughter finally dragged me away. It was about 1:30. Summerfest is a huge event in its own right with amusement park rides, local bands playing all day, stunt shows, etc., but I thought the day would never turn into evening. Finally about 5:30, they opened the gates to the amphitheater. I had to see where our seats were; we went in.

We weren't as close as I'd have liked but we could clearly see the stage. The theater seats about 24,000. We were in the covered front section - I can't imagine what the lower section people saw. Anyway, at almost exactly 7:30, the Frogs came on-stage. I had never heard them before. It was difficult to concentrate on them, especially after an EV sighting about 10 minutes into their 30 minute set. Poor Eddie was apparently trying to tape them from behind a towering amp when he was spotted. Even the lead singer's angel winged green sequined suit accessorized with a pink feather boa was no match for that; everyone's attention was on that amp.

After a short interval, Bad Religion came on with a high powered, kick-ass set of almost non-stop music. Another short interval and then at 9PM, there they were trooping on-stage, Jack first, then Mike, Jeff, Stone, and EV. Everyone was on their feet, screaming. They launched into "Ocean", then Eddie said, "Glad you could make it," then more music. At one point, Jeff, Eddie and Stone appeared to be having a discussion. EV came to the mike and said, "We're having a band argument about playing the next song. Well, I mean we'll play a next song, we just haven't decided what it'll be." It was Jeremy.

The band seemed really happy to be playing and very energetic. I sort of expected it from Jeff and Stone, but Eddied was jumping a bit and twirling with the mike stand. At one point he made a dash to the far left of the stage and danced alone. At one point, all four jumped at once.

One of the high points for me was "Yellow Ledbetter", one of the songs I was hoping to hear. The stage was bathed in blue light and Eddie introduced Mike who played alone, then EV sang. For the first time, it really sounded like it had lyrics, but don't ask me what they were. Mike's guitar solo during it was awesome, including some mind blowing feedback. The audience was great, too. We all knew all the words and sang along. We were all deliriously happy to be there and it showed. Eddie said about halfway though the show that there was a good feeling there and it was due to us. "Please accept our thanks," he said. He also seemed to realize we all want to see him. He kept pulling his hair back form his face with both hands. Between songs at one point, he silently walked to the lip of the stage and stood motionless staring into space, apparently just so we could all get a

good look at him. He also picked up a cap someone tossed, rubbed it against his hair and tossed it back, along with a water bottle he'd used. (I was glad to see he only drank water.)


The music rolled on in long segments, with just a few breaks for EV to speak. His longest statement touched on the tour problems. "I haven't read the pares in the last 10 days so I don't know what they're saying, but I know the media and MTV are saying we're alienating everyone, including you, but I want you to know it's not for. Because this next song is 'Not For You'." Another high point.


When they launched into "Alive" it made my evening. It was great. Then, during the encore, a surreal moment. Eddie said there was a local group he was going to bring out, "and I hope you love the fuck out of them" and introduced "Thunder & Lightning", a lounge act that apparently does a Neil Diamond tribute show. The man and woman were dressed in black and silver lame' outfits and exhorted the crowd to "put their hands together" and sang some obscure Diamond song. Eddie sat on stage left holding a mic in one hand and a sheaf of papers in the other. These must have been lyrics because the duo suddenly said, "Take it, Eddie," and EV sang about 2 verses of Neil Diamond! The man can make anything sound great. Then he said, "Fuck it. ", dropped the papers and ushered the group off. An amazing leg pull. I think if Eddie hadn't stayed on stage during it, there'd have been a riot - at least by me. The band reappeared and launched into an abbreviated "Porch", the last song. Afterward, someone in the audience had said it had been a religious experience. Ditto. They play like a force of nature, powerful. seamless. visceral. Live, even songs I've never been fond of were great, Like "Betterman" with it's beautiful singing by EV. Oh, and at the end of "Daughter", EV talk/sang "I'm not Your Steppin' Stone". the old Monkees' song. The band interacted like friends, EV even leaned against Jeff's back while singing. Eddie joked about the SF cancellation near the start of the show. "My stomach really hurts, I may have to stop... Just kidding."

At the end of a killer rendition of "Blood", Mike smashed his beautiful red guitar into an amp repeatedly until it finally splintered. He and Eddie threw shards of it into the audience. EV had thrown the mic stand just before the guitar break and danced in place, then had to dive for it when he realized the break was ending. He ended up singing on his knees. Even though it was and is EV's remarkable voice that attracted me to PJ, I'm well aware that this is a band! Because Jeff, Stone, Mike, and now Jack (PJ has a "Spinal Tap"-like drummer problem) as are so good, they help Eddie rise to his best level. It takes 5 guys to be this great. I'm 49 and been listening to rock since the 50's and as far as I'm concerned, they're the Greatest band I've ever heard. Theirs is the first fan club I've ever joined. No band has ever moved me in as many ways as this one. I feel very luck to have seen them live.

Altogether, it cost me about \$800 for a 2 hours 15 minutes PJ concert. Yes it was worth it. "See you again sometime," EV said at the end. Oh, I hope so.

My best friend and I arrived at the site at 3:00pm. We chilled under a tree and watched the people. So many different faces; all united in one name. A vibe was felt upon our arrival such a feeling of warmth, acceptance, purpose, and freedom. We waited in line for an hour till the gates were opened. Everyone around us was excited, we were not alone. As we finally walked upon the field, the sweet Chicago sun opened our eyes and souls to the preview taking place in our heads. We found our place in front of the fucking stage!!!! For 2 hours we chilled.....People were cool and friendly. My best friend said to me, "It's like a picnic, a community picnic," Hell yeah, a picnic for PEARL JAM!!!!! We sat surrounding the altar-resembling-stage laughing, smoking, sucking on snow cones, and enjoying ourselves. More fans arrived, but none like the familiar faces contained within our own little community. Faces who arrived more than 6 hours before THE BAND was to begin. Many wannabe fan-fuckers asked me, "Why are you going there so early??" "Well," I explained to them, "we arrived at the bufu hour simply for the ones we love(PEARL jAM!!). We thrive on being apart of the music, not watching it!!! We want to be with the band. be by their sides supporting every fucking action/thought they preserve within us!!" Some also said to me, "You just wanna mosh!!" My response was."MOSH MOTHERFUCKER?! Tell me

echoing the other guitars and Ed's voice. That song sounds great live, a definate treat. People began to chill a bit, the comforting vibe still remained. "The waiting drove me mad! You're finally here and I'm a mess!" Those first 2 lines of "Corduroy" applied so greatly to me at that point. I was sweaty. I was shity. I didn't care because it was everything I'd been waiting for!! Continually throughout the performance. Ed blessed the crowd with his water. He looked out for us and through his example we looked out for eachother. Water was passed around, we all shared a cup. No one was greedy. All was cool or in Ed's words, "This is alright!" "Whipping" was fun and the new song was great. Ed helped out on guitar. Very moving song. They played it in Milwaukee also. Being as creative as they are, hearing a new song sounds so different. yet it grows familiar by the end of the song. New songs remind me that, "everything has changed, absolutly nothing's changed," I leved watching everyone around me during that new song. No one knew the words, but everyone grooved to the sounds. All that could be heard was the music......."Dissident" kicked ass as it usually does. "Even Flow" the first classic old song was played. That song makes everyone dance. It will forever remind me of the reason I became aquainted with TEN. On that hot summer night, the band dedicated the song to the famous Wesley Willis. Following "Even Flow" was "Deep." Never has that song meant so much to me. It felt as if Ed was an old storyteller in everyone's own living room, inside each mind. As he whispered, "and she doesn't like the view, doesn't like view....." sent shivers throughout my soul. Powerful shit!!! "Jeremy" was special when we all raised arms in a V. To hear Ed sing "Jeremy" in his hometown meant much, dispite how many times I've heard that song. "Glorified g" was great!!!

We feel the sounds. We don't hurt eachother because we are with eachother experiencing the sounds of music. Why the fuck would we be out to hurt one another?? When we are contained with eachother in a limited amont of room, for a limited amont of time, we become one. You may call that "moshing," I call it intimatly experiencing the music." So, with those words tatooed upon my soul, I was ready for anything!

Chicago July 11 cont.

At 6pm the music began. Otis Rush, a great Chicago Blues band, christened the stage. We all respected and enjoyed the music. In fact, a peaceful vibe was sent through us. No one moshed. We listened. We grooved. We surfed. At one point. Otis looked upon us and smiled watching the kids surf to his blues. What a moment. Watching the neighbors around me, I got the feeling that hardly any of us had seen a blues band live before. Although, that did not matter. We all accepted a Blues Great, and he accepted us. Thank you PEARL jAM for opening our monotonous ears and minds!!

Bad Religion went on at 7:20pm. They were on for what seemed like an eternity. Sweet showers of water were sent upon our baking bodies. Neighbors had squirt guns and spray bottles, what a treat! Bad Religion was desent. Personally, I really do not like Bad Religion, but they were there for the guys. They also accepted a majorly fucked up tour, distorted with troubles. We all need to give a little more credit and respect to Bad Religion in the future. As they finally left the stage, the hour wait began......

The candles were lit. A sea of people flooded the seats behind me. The stage was being transformed into an altar, an altar of the most sacred melodies. No beer was sold. No tee-shirts were sold. Basically, no bull shit. Some neighbors were getting fucked up. Being where I was at that point in time was a high which has lasted me much longer than a couple hours!! The lights went off. THEY took the stage. A roar elapsed and I could not believe I was seeing them again. The chords began. I entered heaven in what seemed to be my own backyard. I love PEARL jAm!!! I love Chicago! 




his Fiasco were supposed to be one of the opening acts.)



Kath's Southern Tour Journal September 14 - 18, 1995

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from your Footsteps editors...

I ALWAYS SHED TEARS WHEN I SEE PEARL JAM, although my first big tears of the September southern Pearl Jam tour were due to the fact that my flight from San Jose, which I was taking to Milwaukee then to Austin, was late getting in to Milwaukee, forcing me to miss my connecting flight to Austin. God bless 'em, Northwest Airlines rerouted me on another airline; unfortunately by the time I checked in and found out the rerouting information, THAT flight (via American Airlines) had left for Austin with my luggage and without me. sob...sob...sob...handed in my ticket...sob... sob...sob...have to meet friends in Phoenix tomorrow....gotta be in Austin to catch a flight to Phoenix." "Bitch, why the hell did you route yourself this way?" I'm sure the nice ticket agent wanted to say when she spoke, "you certainly routed yourself creatively." I said something about cheap fares being worth changing planes four times, between the sobs. 'The things I do for Pearl Jam', I thought to myself. After I calmed down, got rebooked on a flight directly to Phoenix and became able to deal with being without my luggage for a night, I remembered one very important thing. I would go through all this bullshit and a whole fucking lot more just to see those beautiful boys up there on that stage. Ain't no jump like a Jeff Ament jump during "Porch" or "Evenflow", or a thrownback head during "Rearview mirror"; ain't no more beautiful sight than an orgasmic McCready face during "Immortality"; nothing more mesmerizing that Stoney mouthing those guitar riffs, marching in place or grooving a riff so hard you think his neck is going to come off of his shoulders; nothing more exhilarating than seeing the fresh new beginnings of "Pearl Jam Phase 4: The Jack Years" during just about any song... and no greater passion than the sound of Eddie's voice and words, spoken live to me, only 10 feet away - that raging, mournful, anguished, helpless, lost, angry and raw sound affecting me as nothing else ever has. In this instance, as has happened so many other times in the last 3 1/2 years of my life, my passion for Pearl Jam can get me through anything. And make me do anything. Hell, if I can spend 12 hours on planes to fly to a city that is a 2 hour flight from my house, just so I can see Pearl Jam... well, I guess I'm capable of just about anything.

September 13- BY THE TIME I GET TO PHOENIX, I MAY SMELL BAD. Mike Watt, I love you... stayed at a Phoenix Super 8 in honor of Watt. The only thing that came in clear on the TV was the Playboy Channel...not tonight dear, I have a headache. Place is too dirty to take a shower in, and me without underwear. Next day, everyone else was flying in at three various times in Phoenix; I was there first- a night earlier. Damn the Embassy Suites in Phoenix rocked! The cab rides didn't. The show did. Veteran's Memorial were a rowdy bunch, but everyone in the crowd seemed to take care of each other pretty well, which is a remarkably welcome trend in the mosh. We sat up kinda far, but shared binoculars in a well choreographed passing routine. It's wonderful going to Pearl Jam shows with other "veterans"; everyone knows to pass to Randy during "State", 'Ledbetter" or "Immortality", and me during "Evenflow", "Porch" and selected highlights of "Rearviewmirror" or any time I moan and claw at them. Deferred the aftershow pass to traveling pal Brian so he could see some old friends; and stayed mellow, still recovering from jet lag and Jeff lag. Both can overwhelm.

September 14- LAS CRUCES VIA EL PASO, rent a car then drive to Las Cruces. Venue was 8,000, but they were still selling tickets at the door. Those of you who become Negative Nellies and Nelsons when PJ tickets go on sale, take heart! This was the case at most of the Pearl Jam shows we have been to! By making tickets available at the door, scalpers have been made virtually non-existent at Pearl Jam shows. Why pay more, when you can get 'em at the door? A big middle finger and "SO THERE" to lame-ass people and members of the press who measure Pearl Jam's ticket success by a congressional decision. What more useful benefit could a concert-goer enjoy than reasonably-priced, easy-to-obtain tickets? Think about it Ticketmaster. Hats off to the security of the Pan American center; they actually directed Randy and I to the right places.

The minute we walked through the guest list entrance, Eric Johnson was walking out...no more beautiful way to start the concert experience than with a hug from Eric-he's the best. He directed us to Kelly's "office" and we roamed around a hall or two, running directly into Mike soon afterward. Hugs and a brief word, then Mike off in search of facilities. We slipped into the hospitality room and snagged some water, spotting a few familiar crew faces, and a very familiar Eddie face. In all the times (24) that we have seen Pearl Jam, I have really only seen him off stage a handful of times. To see him looking so relaxed, smiling and beautiful really made me happy. I didn't want to stare, but dammit it's hard not to!!! Eddie was sitting at a table talking, smiling broadly. He looked like he hadn't visited with Mr. Razor in a couple days, just the perfect amount of scruff.

Wandered down the hall and knocked on Kelly's "door", giving him and Dave from Monkeywrench copies of Footsteps #8 which we thought they had seen, but they hadn't. Dave was very enthusiastic about it, especially about the Classified section. "See, this is great. You should have more of this." I told him that connecting with other fans was why we started Footsteps. And that the classified section was probably the most important and popular feature of the fanzine. We continued to chat for a few minutes, the phrase "So, you guys are going to interview Mike" spoken by Kelly still leaving Randy and I in a tizzy. "We are???" We thought. About to venture through the crowd from seeing Kelly, when I heard a voice I vaguely recognized thanking someone for earplugs. "Lindsay?" I asked. "Kathy! Randy!" Weird. We had wanted to hook up with Lindsay, but hadn't had a chance. We stood in the corridor chatting for a few minutes, then ducked into the hospitality room again, sitting down at a table near the door. Oh, the amazing hand fate has in gracing my life with such amazing people. Lindsay is definitely a special gift!

Showtime. Can it be that Randy and I are the only guests again, just like Rochester? It seemed that way! Oh god! We stood in the usual place behind Kari at the monitor soundboard, a mere 10 feet from Stone. "How am I going to not scream and jump up and down?" I asked myself. Especially when Tremor Christ started. That Stoney groove kills me everytime, his neck movements

force you to get into it. Then to be followed by the raging "Corduroy" solo...Looking at the set list that rested on the soundboard, I prayed that they would stick to it, then...oh god-WHIPPING! YES! Yes! Yes! Jeff is singing and bouncing and leaning backwards, pelvis outward. Lord help me, I'm melting into the stage. More raging with Not For You. Song after song, all I could do shake my head incredulously and try to maintain my wits. Beautiful vibe. Studly moshpit survivor Cindy ended up standing next to a Footsteps reader, for chrissakes, and I had the privilege of meeting her after the show. Damn. Almost two hours later, the ultimate coincidence-the boys played "Footsteps" as if it were especially for us. Beautiful Eric Johnson came up to us as the show was winding down, giving me a big bear hug; just as I was about to say the same thing to him, he said "Hey they're playing your song." "Yeah, they are," was all this dumfounded Queen could manage, hoping that the big ass grin on my face would say it all. Las Cruces left me feeling such euphoria, It would have been okay if the tour ended there. Onwards to Austin....

September 15-16 AUSTIN - Leave it to the girl from Jersey (that's our Ran) to walk into the Southwest airlines departure gate, see Joey Ramone and say, "Ah, flying the cheap airlines huh?" "What did you expect?" Joey replied, causing all of us to laugh. Short flight to Austin later, crickets everywhere. Drove in to downtown Austin, 6th Street, roamed around. If you've been to Berkeley, CA, it's like Telegraph Ave. times 100 with a club every third building and blocked off streets. Went to Emo's, hung out with Lindsay, tried to wade through the masses. Literally ran into Dave and James from Monkeywrench walking up 6th street; they were driving with Eddie from show to show in the Monkeywrench van. I asked what that was like and Dave kinda went "Ugh!" with a big smile on his face. James laughed too; seems that either Ed will drive for an hour then conk out, or drive for twelve hours straight without stopping. And the only place he eats is Taco Bell. Run for that border, Ed. Orders the same thing every time, but neither James not Dave could remember what. The gang of us separated, Lindsay and I wandering off and running into Stone and Smitty. I introduced Lindsay to Stone, and she made Smitty laugh heartily when she extended her hand to Stone and said, "You need a shave." Stone chuckled and uttered something about needing some sleep. The two of them were frustrated with the overcrowded streets and were venturing back to the hotel. Lindsay and I laughed, stopped and talked to a person or two, and generally had a blissfully silly time.

Showtime, it's hot. Don't sit in the dirt, there are fire ants, I'm warned. Thank god for the Avon sunblock stick one of my co-workers had given me for my trip-it was a life saver. Ran, Kat and I eventually met up with our pal Brian and were graced with V.I.P. passes, so we could watch from the stage. I need to sidetrack for a minute to point out that this Austin show marked the 22nd time Ran and I have seen Pearl Jam; I can understand how a pissed off a person who has had to fight tooth and nail just to see ONE show must feel to hear that we've seen the boys that many times, and I apologize for that, however...DAMMIT!- I am proud of that fact! Triple connection flights, rental cars, cab rides, sharing hotel rooms, mounting debt be damned. I gotta see my boys one more time.


But the fun doesn't stop there, no sir. We hung out before the show a little bit; I had a blast people watching. Dennis Rodman, magenta hair and entourage included, was a truly beautiful sight. Way more beautiful though was realizing that Kat hadn't seen PJ live since Houston 1992, and that Ran and I were gonna get to be there with her to share the experience. I had only known of Kat through Randy's loving description of her, and knew we would hit it off when Ran told me Kat was worried about bursting in to tears at the show, as she fully expected herself to. I have emptied many a Kleenex Travel Pack myself; finally I would have a sobbing partner! Eventually Kelly escorted Ran, Kat and I to the usual spot (right behind the monitor soundboard on Stone's side of the stage). When Pearl Jam hit the stage, the view was indescribably perfect. I was having a blast watching Stoney seriously mouthing some riffs, marching in place and swinging his arm around, until some dickhead threw a shirt on stage and it landed on him. He already had a shirt on, asshole, he didn't need yours. After that, Stone was more mellow. Eddie paused early on to make sure the heat and the body crush was tolerable for the people in the front.

Ever since seeing Pearl Jam perform the song "Elderly Woman Behind the Counter in a Small Town" in Fairfax, Virginia the day of Kurt Cobain's death, I was forever changed. That night ('Kurt Cobain Night' as I call it), it was overwhelming to hear the shared voices of the audience singing along to 'Small Town'; there was no denying how badly everyone in that concert hall needed the music, needed to sing out and know that someone was listening, that we really weren't as empty as we felt that night. (Sorry to be so heavy, man, but this is how I feel...shit, it's a wonder Eddie or the rest of the guys haven't gone out of their minds, what with all the pressure we put on them to help us FEEL something. Can't we just headbang? Maybe I should just get some therapy instead!) At any rate, the emotion of the moment will stick with me until I'm old and gray (okay, older and grayer). So now, just like a wolf howls at the full moon, I cry during certain parts of 'Small Town'. It's a Pavlovian reflex. And as you can imagine, here in Austin my heart caught in my throat when "Small Town" started. Batten down the hatches, here comes the flood.

Kat and I looked at each other, grasping hold of one another's hand as Eddie sung the lines "I just wanna scream hello". The sound of the crowd singing along, their voices swelling with Eddie's once again brought back the flood of emotions I have felt ever since 'Kurt Cobain night'... "My god it's been so long, never dreamed you'd return, but now here you are and here I am - hearts and thoughts they fade...fade away." The touch of a hand and the sharing of tears with Kat was really special to me; her passion for the words and music that she has been building up over the past three years was so clearly felt at that moment, it was beautiful to share it

with her. Yeah, I cried, but this time it was because I felt so full, not so empty.

How Ran and I are dear friends and partners is a miracle because of our oppositeness; as much as I love Pearl Jam's music for how it affects my emotions, Ran loves it for how it affects...her loins. And almost nothing can carry Randy off into la-la land more than watching live two very important things: Mike during 'State of Love and Trust' (which we were treated to) and Mike's guitar solo on "Immortality". A quick zap of panic hit me at one point right as the 'Immortality' solo began; I was certain that Randy would storm out onstage and pull Stone out of the way when he blocked her view of Mike for a second. Thankfully for all concerned, Stone moved - that could have been a disaster. The three of us floated through the rest of the show... Ran got to rock out to 'Once'; I got to blubber some more when Eddie did the R.E.M. tune 'Talk about the Passion' solo acoustic; I can think of no one better suited than Eddie to sing the words " not everyone can carry the weight of the world" with feeling. Powerful, especially moving to me since R.E.M. is the common thread that binds Ran and I (we knew of each other through a mutual R.E.M. fan friend before the Pearl Jam storm hit).





Damn. Writing about this show and reliving the emotional thrill ride that is a Pearl Jam show kinda makes me want to give it all up for Kenny G or Michael Bolton; this is exhausting! As if I weren't overloaded enough, the throbs and pounds of the bass during 'Whipping' once again sent me into orbit. Yes, my hormones are talking, but those Jeff movements, this leaning back thrust thing and this seductive shaking of the shoulders - frankly I think it should be illegal. To me the Whipping Move is a lethal weapon, transforming me without fail from big woman to helpless little puddle of jello. Two shows in a row! The gamut of feelings that get stirred up in me at Pearl Jam shows is unreal; being able to share the ride with two dear friends made Austin very special for me. That, and I got to see Eric Johnson's cool new toaster and teapot tattoos. It don't get any better.

September 17 - NEW ORLEANS- It's raining...is there gonna even BE a show? After the last two shows, I was ready to relax a bit and enjoy being out in the crowd and being able to jump up and down like the phreak I am (that practice is generally frowned upon when you're watching on stage). It was fun to focus on the whole show rather than mostly Jeff; when we're up close I have no choice but to watch him. See, that's why Ran and I travel to see Pearl Jam so much; we miss what everyone else in the band does most of the time (for shame!) by focusing on (read that gluing our eyes to) our men. I wanted to try to stay mellow, since we were going to be interviewing Mike after the show. It was a nice relaxed experience, but an intense show. Even though the tour was a short one, it was still the last show. By now the guys had three shows under their belts, and were fired up. Gormley was the largest of the four concert venues, and the bigger the place the harder the guys hit the stage. Tonight the guys blasted
blam> right down that wildfire on stage! Very intense performances, and they kept the level going with every song. By the time they got to the rarely performed 'Rats', we noticed Eddie falter a bit and walk off stage. I think a combination of the thick, humid Southern air and the full throttle intensity of the performance were a bit overwhelming. I have noticed a tendency for Eddie to overload occasionally at big given oxygen at the side of the stage because he became dizzy and short of breath. Gee, Ed if you didn't want to do 'Rats', you just had to say so.

Eddie got better while the guys jammed (that's what they do best!), and finished the rest of the show without a hitch. The encores were the best; Brendan O'Brien added a nice Hammond organ to 'Betterman', and Joey Ramone joined the band for 'Sonic Reducer'. The highlight for me was watching Joey and Eddie trying to share a microphone (imagine a basketball player and a jockey standing next to one another, and you've got the picture). Eddie finally dashed back behind Jack, grabbed Nicky's small gold ionic column table (I swear he sets a living room up every show next to Jack's drum kit), plopped it down next to Joey, and - voila! Eddie jumped up on it, and it worked perfectly. He's always thinking, that Eddie...

Shows over, off we go to chat with Mike. You'll see the results in this fanzine; it was a really great conversation and a nice unexpected opportunity. Though I may have already expressed this idea, I think it's important that you know that Pearl Jam's music affects me like nothing I've ever experienced before; the first time the passion hit me, I became almost consumed by the strength of the emotional dambursting the music created in me. The raw, free passion and honesty of the music knocked me on my ass. To have to the music and letting it take them away just like it took me away...Christ, how could I not want to keep experiencing that? My love for Pearl Jam inspired and awakened parts of me that I didn't even know existed; helped me heal wounds I never thought would heal. Listening to the music live and watching Eddie 'speak to me' in person through the music has become almost religious to me. Seeing them is like going to church; it's like having a safe, comfortable place I can go to renew myself. I get to feel truly "Alive" at my Pearl Jam church service; I get to laugh, cry, rage, groove and release. Woah... that's kinda heavy, huh? The best part is...I know that the person reading this right now feels the exact same way that I do about this band and their music. That is the coolest feeling of all.

This show had the energy of the 92' shows, coupled with the focus of seasoned muscians, making a staggeringly impressive mix of professionalism and spontaneity. Lots of penned in energy from a audience that had seen two cancellations, brought the whole affair to a stunning level of frenzy, where you don't even remember your past life. Our guys have the confidence and experience now to experiment, and jam , and play multiple weird covers that they don't even know. The new and improved Mike Mc Cready is nothing short of stellar in his emotive, moving, and inspirational lead guitar. Eddie's being, becoming the characters he sings about, seems effortless as he tirelessly taps into the deepest meaning of each song. Experiencing the last few shows it's clear that he has got a grip on his fame and his life, with the communication of his stories the most important thing to him and He comes on the stage and immediately starts a spitting contest with the hunks in the front row, moving towards them, his hands beckoning them to "Yeah come on, do it!" The spit flew, showering the stage. He made no move to get out of the way, becoming quite a marksman with his body fluids, he got off a few well placed sprays. Blessed, we were blessed with this show. There's nothing left to say. Stone's smile never left his face except to turn into laughing. At times Jeff would just roll his eyes at the craziness happening on stage. Jack, becoming more and more a part of the integral core, beaming as they gather close around him to jam. Mike so full of it, he finds his guitar has slid off and is around his ankles. Eddie sails past on a stool. He sails past again on an oversized skateboard, stopping to do a few tricks. He sits on the side of the stage, the crowd below him goes nuts, wanting him to come closer, he motions "Who me?" Eddie, the prankster, the hero, the savior, the coy ingenue, he lets his whole body go limp as he hangs on the mic stand, the victim, flashes of joy, passion, love, determined to live on his own terms. He's clearly a person approaching the joys of a full range of emotional expression. He stands still at the front of the stage. A blinding white light about eight inches in diameter appears on his chest, a laser, he doesn't move, no one moves. He looks down at it. He slowly touches it with his hand, with the expression on his face like it might be capable of hurting him, but if it would...he'd just watch. What we can't see is he has a small thin round mirror in his hand. He reflects this piercing light into the crowd, coming from the center, his chest, his heart, he slowly scans the crowd, sharing it all with us, connecting with us, touching us all. Reaching us with the light. He's peaceful.


